

Na Buan-Orduithe - Standing Orders

In order that the proceedings of the Convention are carried out without delay, the following Standing Orders will be observed:

- 1) The proposer of a motion may not speak for more than five minutes.
- 2) A delegate speaking on a motion may not speak for more than three minutes.
- 3) The proposer of a motion may speak for a second time for three minutes before a vote is taken.
- 4) No delegate may speak a second time in the debate on the same motion.
- 5) The Chairperson may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- 6) A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairperson, move 'that the question be now put', after which when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- 7) When Convention considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.
- 8) A speaker to the Secretary's Report/Sub Committee Reports or to any other general discussion shall not exceed three minutes on any one topic.
- 9) The Chairperson may consider any matter not on the Clár with the consent of the majority of the delegates present and voting.

MOTION 1

Amend An Cumann Lúthchleas Gael, Coiste Chontae Fhear Manach, Fo-Dhlithe/Bye-Laws 4 to read-

4. PLAYING ELIGIBILITY/TRANSFERS

As the Gaelic Athletic Association is community centred, based on the allegiance of its members to their local Clubs and Counties, the Transfer and Declaration Rules in the Official Guide and in these Bye-Laws reflect that ethos. A player is considered to owe allegiance and loyalty to his First Club, as defined in Rule 6.3 T.O. 2023 and in these Bye-Laws.

Attachment to First Club

(1) A person, with a permanent residence within the County Boundary of Fermanagh, seeking to become a member of the Association shall have an unfettered choice of clubs to join.

Transfers Within County

- (2) Official Transfer Forms, which provide for the signature of the Transferee and the Secretary of the club to which the member wishes to join, shall be used for all transfer applications within the county.
- (3) No transfer shall be granted unless it is properly before the meeting.
- (4) Any player wishing to transfer from one Club to another within the County, shall make application between 09:00 on January 1st and 23:59 on March 31st (inclusive).

Exception to (4): A player who has not played with a club for 96 weeks may apply for a transfer at any time during a year, provided the application for transfer is in order and complies with (2) – (3) above.

- (5) All applications for transfer are to be submitted to the County Secretary. The County Secretary shall pass all applications received to the Competitions Control Committee, which shall notify clubs from which transfers are sought.
- (6) In accordance with Rule 6.4 (c), (e), T.O. 2023, the Competitions Control Committee shall process and decide on all applications for transfer within the jurisdiction of Coiste Contae Fhear Manach.

(7) A transfer request is primarily a matter between a player and the County Committee. When a player signs a transfer request form, his current Club has no right to delay or refuse permission for this request. If the Club has a valid reason as to why a player may not be granted a transfer, its duty is to state such reason, quoting the applicable rules, to the County Secretary, who will relay this information to the County Competitions Control Committee or to request a hearing, in accordance with Rules 6.4 (c), (d) and (f) T.O. 2023.

(8) The County Competitions Control Committee, when adjudicating and reaching its determination on a transfer or permission to play application, shall give due consideration to the response of his current Club, and

(a) be cognisant of the role played by his current Club in nurturing and developing the player;

(b) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on his current Club; and

(c) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on the promotion of the Association's aims in the County.

Administration/Governance.

Affiliations.

Twenty-three clubs affiliated to Fermanagh GAA in 2024, namely, Aghadrumsee St. MacCartans, Belcoo O'Rahillys, Bellanaleck Art Mc Murroughs, Brookeborough Heber McMahons, Coa O' Dwyers, Derrygonnelly Harps, Derrylin O' Connells, Devenish St. Marys, Ederney St. Josephs, Enniskillen Gaels, Erne Gaels Belleek, Irvinestown St. Molaise, Kinawley Brian Boru/St Marys Killesher, Knocks Grattans, Lisbellaw St Patricks, Lisnaskea Emmetts, Naomh Aodhán Derrylin, Newtownbutler First Fermanaghs, Roslea Shamrocks, St Patricks, Teemore Shamrocks, and Tempo Maguires.

Our County Committee met on ten occasions. We provided face to face meetings on ten occasions using the facilities in Fermanagh House and one meeting was held via Microsoft Teams.

Between County Committee meetings, Management Committee met on nine occasions, using the facilities of the county office and Microsoft Teams. Thanks to all the County Committee Officers who put in so much time and effort on behalf of the Association in Fermanagh.

All our Sub-Committees present a report to County Committee meetings and bearing in mind that each Sub- Committee has its own report included, I will comment as briefly as possible on the work of each. It is important to record appreciation of the work of the many individual members on such Committees and I ask that Club Officers and delegates to Convention read these reports as they

reveal a tremendous volume of work.

Competitions Control Committee (CCC).

This committee, chaired by John McGovern and Secretary Phil Flanagan, Youth Secretary Leanne Prior, and Hurling Committee Secretary, Roisin Smyth this year ensured that a fixtures programme across all levels was delivered.

The CCC report to tonight's Convention details the number of all adult games across all levels in football and hurling. While there was almost 100% fixtures played across the Senior Leagues, I have concern on the number of games not played across the Erne Cup (Reserve) leagues. From the league tables provided, there were 40 games available to clubs not played.

Youth Committee.

Our Youth Committee, under the leadership of Eoghan Cassidy (Chairperson) and Leanne Prior (Secretary) worked again in conjunction with the CCC, to deliver a programme of meaningful games this year. Leanne has again presented a comprehensive report for tonight's Convention detailing all activity across football and hurling at youth level which has already being discussed at last week's Annual Youth meeting.

Leanne quite rightly refers to the decision in respect of the reversal of the underage gradings back to evens and the difficulties it presented in planning fixtures across age grades involving both club and county grades. 'Despite these issues the report informs us that there were 465 football fixtures scheduled on servasport this season for our youth and despite all of the hurdles, we still achieved a very respectable 95.25% fulfilment of football fixtures, which was equally as heartening as it was a relief'.

I wish to thank Eoghan and Leanne for all their hard work and particular this year taking on the extra administration of all the Youth Hurling fixtures.

County Hurling Committee

This year our county chairperson Brian Armitage had to step back into the role of committee chairperson as no one else would take on the role. Roisin Smyth from Enniskillen Gaels took on the role of as secretary this year. At club level youth competitions at U.12, U.14, U-15 -Feile and U.16 age groups were organised and completed. It was disappointing that out of the 12 organised games at U-16 level 7 were not played and proposals for small sided games at minor level only received interest from two clubs. Congratulations to all who took part in the youth activity this year, details of competition winners are included in the Youth Committee report.

On a positive note I want to acknowledge both St Michael's College and St Aidan's High School on competing the Ulster Schools competitions. My congratulations to St Michael's on wining the U-15.5 - Corn de Dannan, the first for the school. I thank both Frank Hughes St Michaels College and Sean Bradley at Aidan's High School for their work in promoting hurling.

Coaching and Games Development Committee.

Our Coaching and Development work is led by our Games Development Manager, Teresa McNabb assisted by Eoin Bradley (Athletic Development Coach) to March 2024, and our schools/club coaches-Keith Reilly, Jonny Garrity, Pat Cadden & Ultan Kelm and from September Fionan O'Brien (Student placement for one year) I want to thank them for all their work and commitment throughout the year.

The GAA introduced actions to review coaching job descriptions, scales of basic pay and new terms of condition contracts across all counties. Our collaborate efforts have not yet achieved the recruitment of a person to the role of 'GAA County Performance/Talent Development Lead' for Fermanagh.

Following the completion of two separate recruitment processes, two job offers and contracts were presented to the successful candidates but on each occasion but they turned down the offers mainly due to salary remuneration issues in the six counties.

We also carried out a review in respect of coaching. In his report to Convention, our Coaching Officer Ferghal O'Connor confirms that review of coaching activities is completed and will be presented to all stakeholders in early 2025.

Eoin Bradley

Eoin Bradley took up the role of Athletic Development Coach in 2016. After eight years of service to Fermanagh GAA Eoin left this role on the 27th March. I want to thank Eoin's for his contribution to Fermanagh GAA and wish him well for the future.

Hearings Committee.

The Hearings Committee, again this year under Chairman Pat McGurn, Secretary Martin McBrien had the difficult task of adjudicating on many hearing requests, and I express my thanks to the members of our Hearings Committee for carrying out this role. It is worth again highlighting that the Hearings Committee adjudicate on all disciplinary matters where a hearing is requested, relating to the enforcement of rules arising from matters under the jurisdiction of the County Committee.

The role of both CCC and County Hearings Committee is set out in rule (GAA Official Guides & Codes and County By-law) and the GAA Disciplinary handbook provides further advice for everyone involved in the disciplinary process.

Referees Administration Committee.

I thank Fergal Cleary (Chairperson & Appointments Officer) and Dermott Love (Administrator) for their work throughout the year.

Our Referee's Secretary Dermott Love in his report to tonight's Convention again highlights the need for the recruitment of referees at club level and support from clubs in providing umpires in support of their referee for championship games. I note a low number of female referees available to take on the responsibility of refereeing their games. We must work together to address this issue to ensure that there is enough to cover all our games across the GAA & LGFA.

The issues of the behaviour of team officials and players are addressed in the recently published Football Review Committee report. It is proposed to issue tough penalties in respect of dissent to the referee decisions, conduct by team officials, new rules on who can speak to the referee on the field of play. We await the outcome of the decisions from Special Congress. My understanding at this stage is that any rules passed will be implemented in 2025.

County Planning and Training Committee.

This committee, under the Chairmanship of Tiernach Mahon and administered by Secretary Leanne Prior, has placed their efforts this year on supporting our clubs in respect of Club Officer training, County Officer Development courses and Club Governance issues. Tiernach highlights Club Governance issues and training which includes managing governance issues of the club by adopting

the Club Constitution rules, attending role specific training, using the courses offered to improve skills in respect of using Foirean and Microsoft 365 and getting to know Data Compliance issues. We are grateful to all those stewards who facilitate the safe and smooth running of our major fixtures throughout the playing season; a special word of thanks is due to Jim Tummon and Tiernach Mahon in their roles as Event & Safety Managers at Brewster Park, and for their commitment to the organisation and leadership of the county's stewards. I want to also thank all club officers and the many volunteer stewards who took on this responsibility when their clubs were hosting championship games.

Safety and Facilities Committee.

In his report to Convention as Facilities Officer, Sean Donnelly reports on the continuing upgrade work at our Centre at Lissan, health and safety issues, GAA infrastructure issues.

I encourage clubs to continue this good work as it benefits clubs to meet current Health and Safety requirements for all insurance and statutory regulations plus it encourages a culture of health and safety.

Sean Donnelly will provide an update to his report on the purchase of at land at Ashwoods Road Enniskillen. I want to acknowledge and thank Sean Donnelly, Sean Burns, Seamus McMahon and Lauri McCusker for their work so far in respect of this project.

I congratulate all clubs who carried out development work at their grounds namely Brookeborough Heber McMahons on completing a new development, which includes additional dressing rooms, gym and an upgrade to their walking track and carpark. Tempo Maguires installed new floodlights on their main playing pitch. Roslea Shamrocks on the provision of media facilities, 4G pitch and additional toilets, Kinawley Brian Borus on the development of a 4G pitch. Enniskillen Gaels, in conjunction with Fermanagh GAA on the provision of new roof and upgrade to the disabled area in the John Vesey stand. Enniskillen Gaels have also ongoing work in respect up an upgrade to existing dressing rooms and work to their pitch behind the John Vesey stand.

Other clubs have plans in place for development and hopefully we can report on those in 2026.

Cultural/Irish Language and Heritage Committees.

Ciaran Maguire, our Cultural Officer details a considerable amount of activity in his report regarding the promotion and learning of the Irish language and Scór activity. Ciaran is also active in the promotion of Fonndúireacht Sheosaimh Mhic Dhonnacha and but states its 'it is regrettable that a number of clubs do not appoint a Cultural Officer especially in club catchment areas where there is an interest in Scor'.

Ciaran also played a leading role to ensure that Amhrán na bhFiann was sung at most of our championship games where we now have fifteen persons in place to carry out this role. I would also appeal to all managers and players to manage the 'standing to attention' better during the singing or playing of Amhrán na bhFiann at both at county and club level.

Communication and Marketing & IT Committee.

Thanks again to Deirdre Felloni in her role of PRO this year. In her report to tonight's Convention Deirdre details of the committee's activities in 2024.

Deirdre highlights the work done to improve the county website which has improved the viewer

experience.

I want to acknowledge the work put in to deliver match day programmes during the National Football and Hurling League and our club championship season.

We continue to develop Fermanagh GAA TV and I wish to acknowledge the voluntary service provided by a dedicated group people led by Phil Flanagan who now provide for the delivery of quality coverage to our games. I note that our team are looking for volunteers to help. I ask clubs to spread this message especially to students in their clubs who have an interest in following a career in the media etc. This work experience would be valuable to add to their CV.

I want to again acknowledge the work of our local papers - the Fermanagh Herald, the Impartial Reporter, and at provincial level by the Irish News for their continued coverage of our games and activities at all levels.

Regarding Information Technology, our thanks to Niall Cullen who continues to provide a support service to all clubs in respect of GAA IT systems. In his report to convention Niall has again highlighted the issue of scam and phishing emails and reminds all of us to be vigilant and continue to update and be aware of the issues. This is very important when dealing with on-line banking etc.

Child Protection.

Anita Kehoe in her role as the County Children's Officer ensures that everyone is fully aware of their roles and responsibilities in respect of the very important issue of safeguarding.

In her comprehensive report to Convention, Anita highlights the responsibilities all our clubs have in delivering awareness and implementing the 'Code of Behaviour' to all our club members and for all to be vigilant on who they select to coach and manage youth teams.

It is important to repeat Anita's comments, not just today but be mindful throughout the year, in respect of persons selected to work with children-

'Please be mindful that those within our clubs who are selected to work with Children must have mandatory requirements:

- 1. The must have attended the Gaelic Games Child Safeguarding Workshop.
- 2. They must be vetted through Access NI.
- 3. They must possess a minimum foundation coaching qualification received from GAA.

If someone refuses to complete these, you'd need to ask the question 'why'? And if they are suitable to have working with young people in your club.'

I ask all clubs to fully engage and support Anita with this very important work.

Health and Wellbeing.

I thank Damian McHugh (Chairperson) and Ann Curran (Secretary) and other committee members for their work throughout the year. In his report to Convention Damian reports on a variety of activities carried out this year, noting 'We have continued to promote health and wellbeing in our clubs and communities with a variety of activities. The county committee continued to support clubs in the promotion of health and wellbeing in our players, members and wider community'.

It is also important to note that our Health and Wellbeing provide vital support in providing direction to clubs in a time of a critical incident, most importantly by having information in respect of medical

professionals and service providers who can provide immediate support at a time of crisis. I encourage all clubs to review their Critical Incident plan to include updates in respect of committee members contact information etc.

County Finance.

A Finance Committee report from our Treasurer Sean Burns is included with the Accounts and Balance Sheet which will be presented to Convention by our accountant Crudden & Dolan, to whom we are grateful for their continuing advice and support.

I want to thank our dedicated band of workers led by Sean who ensured that match day ticket sale operators and gate persons are in place to cover all our gate requirements at both county and club level.

Club Éirne.

Club Eirne under the leadership of Gerard Tracey (Chairperson) has worked hard at generating funds for the county which will be again detailed in their report to Convention tonight.

Sponsors.

In terms of financial support, we are grateful to all our sponsors, and I appeal to all GAA people in the county to continue to support them. Our thanks to Patsy Tracey - Tracey Concrete, Mc Mahon Health Care, Monaghan Bros and Modern Tyres, providing sponsorship to Senior football, U-20 football and Minor football teams. Our hurling teams were again sponsored by Belter Tech, and we thank Gerard Hughes, Atlanta, Georgia, USA for his continuing support to the county.

Our thanks also to O'Neill's Irish International Sports Company Ltd for their valued sponsorship in respect of gear to all our county teams.

Thanks again this year to Monaghan Bros Lisnaskea who provided a kit van for our senior football team and to our coaching staff for use during the summer camps and their contribution to support Fermanagh GAA TV.



Teemore GAA - Fermanagh GAA Club All Stars Awards.

Thanks again to Teemore GAA- as part of their club fundraising for 2024, for organising the 'Fermanagh GAA Club Players All Star Awards'. All award winners were announced at their event on the 22nd of November, and we congratulate all the winners, awards in recognition to their commitment and efforts to Gaelic games in 2024.

Casement Park Development.

In 2012, stadium designers were appointed to the project, and it was expected the new Casement Park would be built by 2015. It didn't turn out that way, as objections from residents, and objections in planning and safety issues resulted in the delay to carry forward this project. Then came the possibility

that the development would be driven forward in time for the Euros but despite their promises the Labour government pulled the funding. With the original Casement plan now scrapped, the GAA went to work on plans for a new stadium revising the capacity down from 38,000 to about 34,500. On the 15th February the Ulster Council statement announced that it will commence necessary maintenance and pre-enabling works for the development of the new Casement Park.

On the 14th September an update from Ulster GAA, stating 'Ulster GAA has taken every possible step to keep the project on track for the UEFA Euro 2028 Football Championships. This included investing over £4m in critical aspects of pre-enabling works in anticipation of the procurement of the new main contractor.

On his appointment to office the Secretary of State Hilary Benn on behalf of the British Government gave firm commitments that Casement Park will be built, a commitment also given by his predecessor. The statement goes on to state, 'Casement Park will be built, and we will work with all partners to ensure that the promises made by the NI Executive over thirteen years ago and within successive Programmes for Government, to deliver on the strategic stadia need of the GAA in the province and in Belfast, Ireland's second city, are fulfilled.' I welcome the recent comments from Ulster GAA Casement Park Project sponsor.

We engaged with this process throughout, and it is important that we steadfastly continue our support for this project which will deliver a modern GAA stadium in Belfast. Hopefully we will get further updates at the upcoming Ulster Convention in January 25.

Fermanagh LGFA.

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate our County Ladies Senior team, Management and County Board on their excellent win in the All Ireland Junior Football Championship Final which was played. This was the third All Ireland Junior title to come to the county, and the first won in Croke Park so well done to all involved.

Football Review Committee Report

The strategic plan 'Aontas 2026 – Towards One GAA for All' features a variety of objectives to realise the GAA's vision as a sustainable community-based and volunteer-led Association where as many as possible, participate in Gaelic games and culture for as long as possible. A key focus area is to provide "the best possible games experience for players and spectators" with the vision description that "Gaelic games will be the most enjoyable amateur sports in the world to play and watch".

The Football Review Committee (FRC) was set up in February 2024 with the aim of evaluating the current rules and regulations of Gaelic football, the most popular sport on the island.

RESULTS FROM RESEARCH AND ANALYSIS

Across all ages, provinces and grades- the top five skills dominating the on-line survey, and letter/ email correspondence received were: kicking, catching, scoring of long-range points, goal scoring and general creative play. The top three tactical skills were: 1 v 1 contests to gain possession of the ball, taking on an opponent in a 1 v 1 situation, and good support play during speedy attacking transitions. A consistency of similar themes emerged from the committee's engagement with all stakeholders. As a result of these engagements the committee proposed 49 motions in respect of the playing rules to Special Congress which was held on Saturday 30th November.

We held a County Committee meeting via Microsoft Teams on the 18th November to discuss the proposed changes with 21 delegates present. Jim Gavin (FRC) was present to explain the changes and answer points of clarification.

At Special Congress all motions were passed, and we now await further correspondence from National level in respect of the support measures that will be put in place to support managers, coaches, players and referees at both county and club level. It is vital that these supports are provided since we have no preseason competition, and our National Leagues are due to start at the end of January.



Summary of 2024

In 2024, we continued with the same championship structure for the Senior and Intermediate Football Championships that had been used in 2022 and 2023. Slight changes were made to the schedule to provide additional breaks in the peak championship window, which were staggered between the two competitions. Once the national and provincial fixtures for 2025 are released, we will begin planning for 2025 as early as possible.

A change to the Ulster Club championship resulted in Fermanagh's Senior and Intermediate clubs getting Quarter Final and avoiding an earlier start, giving us a slightly longer window to operate within. In the end, it was badly needed, with the SFC Final being postponed due to dangerous winds and then the rescheduled game ending in a draw and requiring a replay.

Provision of Referees

There were changes to the underage schedule this year with the addition of a competitive U12 football competition, resulting in added pressures with regards to the appointment of referees. As is set out in the Competition Regulations, each club must meet the basic target set for the provision of referees.

A word of caution - any club that does not have at least one active and available referee, who has passed all the appropriate requirements by the end of March 2025 will lose home advantage and that will remain the case until sufficient progress has been made. But going forward, one referee is not sufficient to meet the increased number of games taking place across the GAA, in football and hurling, and the LGFA, especially if clubs are intending to enter multiple teams in competitive underage competitions.

We would therefore encourage clubs to identify potential referees urgently and get them lined up for training over the winter months.

Discipline

There was also an apparent growth in the scale of verbal abuse directed towards referees and other match officials, especially in underage matches. This unacceptable behaviour needs to stop and there is a responsibility, in the first instance, on members and on clubs to challenge such behaviour from within their clubs and to show good example to others. The GAA as a whole needs to ensure that appropriate disciplinary action is taken against those who are involved in such practices and to prevent it from recurring. Recent changes to the disciplinary process and a significaint increase in the severity of suspensions for such infractions are not yet proving a sufficient deterrent. Much more work is needed on this in the coming period.

Reserve Football Competitions

This year saw the reconfiguration of the Erne Cups and Reserve Football Championships into three divisions, with varying levels of success. A surge in the number of games conceded from 12 last year to 40 this year in the Erne Cup, albeit 11 of those 40 can be accounted for one team withdrawing early in the competition. The Reserve Football Championship possibly did not work as well with 3 grades, with 5 of the 6 finalists only playing a Semi Final and a Final in their respective competitions. Moving back to 2 grades for the Championship is well worth considering and an examination of the increased conceded games needs explored.

Trophies

history of our clubs and our members. They are not just pieces of silverware but cherished emblems

of pride and achievement. They have often been named after people who have made a significant contribution to our association and have been donated by people who hold the GAA in the highest possible regard. It was therefore shameful to see the scale of damage inflicted on our most prized trophy in recent weeks—a clear reminder of the need for greater care and respect. As custodians of our association, we must ensure these symbols of success are preserved in pristine condition for future generations. We want to take this opportunity reinforce the importance of clubs and GAA members looking after our trophies, keeping them in good condition and treating them with the respect they deserve. Clubs are responsible for the preservation of trophies awarded to them and penalties will be imposed for any damage done.

New Playing Rules

The recently adopted playing rules in Gaelic Football will intensify challenges for referees in club matches, particularly without neutral linespersons and umpires. Solo decision-making under pressure increases the risk of errors, disputes, and added strain on match officials. We would appeal to everyone to give the new rules times to bed in, to be patient with each other and with match officials.

The new rules on dissent and moving the ball on 50m will hopefully eliminate a lot of the unnecessary conduct that has crept into our games in recent years. The new rules will be challenging for all of us and will take time for their full implications to be known. A lot of work was put into their development and they deserve to be trialled for a one year period. There is a certain amount of flexibility allowed in a county with regards to the full implementation of the full suite of rules for underage competitions and that is a conversation to be had in the New Year.

We want to briefly thank a number of people who have assisted the Competitions Control Committee in carrying out our various tasks. Firstly, our sincere thanks to all members of the committee who gave up their time to help organise competitions within Fermanagh.

Thanks to our County Chairperson Brian Armitage for his support over the year. Our County Secretary Tom Boyle was always available to lend a hand where required and we particularly grateful for him for the help he provided with the timely processing of referees' reports. The County Treasurer Sean Burns, along with his team of gatemen and gatewomen make matchdays run much smoother and a massive thanks to all of them for their thankless task of collecting money from people.

The Hearings Committee in the county play a vital role in offering members a chance to challenge any decision made by the CCC on disciplinary matters and our thanks to Pat McGurn, Martin McBrien and all members of that committee.

We are extremely grateful to Leanne Prior for administering underage football and hurling fixtures in the county on behalf of the Competitions Control Committee. It is hard to imagine, but it is an even more challenging job than administering adult fixtures. Thanks also to Eoghan Cassidy, who in his role as Chairperson of the Youth Committee, plays a key leadership role in offering a forum for club members involved in youth affairs across the county.

We want to offer sincere thanks to all of our club secretaries and team managers/mentors for their help, support and understanding with this year's competitions, along with the other club officials who helped out in anyway.

Thanks to Fergal Cleary who was Referees' Appointments Officer and made sure that every game was covered and to Dermott Love who served as the Referees' Administrator providing a vital link between the CCC and the Referees' Committee. Thanks to all those who volunteered

as referees, linespersons, sideline officials or umpires over the course of the year in what is a difficult but necessary role. We want to say a huge thanks to all clubs for providing their facilities to host matches this year.

Youth Committee Report

The 2024 season for the Fermanagh Bord na nÓg, was always going to be a turbulent one, with the reversal of our age grades, after several years at odd ages, back to even age grades again. However, with the Bord na nÓg being led by a strong, diligent and passionate Chairperson in Eoghan Cassidy, no challenge that we encountered this season was ever going to divert attentions away from the main body of work of the Bord na nÓg, which is the provision of a safe and nurturing environment for young people to learn Gaelic games, develop their skills and reach their full potential within our county.

Our underage players in Fermanagh, will spend some of the most enjoyable days of their lives playing Gaelic games, socialising with their friends and making memories that will last a lifetime. They will do so during some of the most important developmental years of their lives. It is our responsibility to ensure, that they enjoy and participate in our Gaelic Games, where our games are conducted in a spirit of fair play, where everyone working on our behalf emphasises respect, equality, safety and non discrimination in all aspects of our work with children and young people, upholding the mission, vision and values of the GAA.

To that end, we are incredibly fortunate to have Eoghan as our Chairperson, with his integrity and great leadership, he oversees our games with great passion, enthusiasm and heart, ensuring the very best for our Fermanagh Gaels and a positive brighter future for Fermanagh Gaelic games going forward. So much of what Eoghan does goes unseen, but we are extremely fortunate to have him lead our Bord na nÓg and I cannot thank him enough for his council, time and commitment.

Tasked with considering several years' worth of underage performances, gradings, rankings, and results, our Fermanagh Youth Gradings Committee, consists of Eoghan Cassidy, Ciarán Carey, John Prunty, Thomas McElroy, Micheál McCaffrey, Sinead Casey and myself. I thank you all for your commitment, experience, and expertise in what is always a complicated and arduous task. This season was no exception, with the move back to the even age grades. Looking back, it took three years for the odd age grades to settle in and we envisage the ripple of problems changing back to evens to be no less complex.

Gradings proved exceptionally difficult this season, particularly with there being 28 teams at U12 level, there was much deliberation and consideration. Every member on that committee puts in an incredible amount of time studying these gradings, scrutinising league tables and challenging placings, to ensure we produce a fair, accurate and competitive grading of teams for the upcoming season. We owe each of them a debt of gratitude for completing this very thankless task.

As we say every season, gradings are not an exact science! We can only use the information at our disposal, we rely heavily on the honest input of clubs as to where their teams' abilities lie and are the first to admit that there may have been oversights made, we are only human after all! However, the more eyes studying this data, the more accurate our gradings can be, the more competitive our games will be and the greater the player development we can expect as a result. Anyone who has an interest in and wishes to join the gradings committee would be most welcome.

The topic of conversation that engulfed the 2023 Bord na nÓg convention was the reversal of the underage gradings back to evens! It was no secret at the time, in fact we could not have reiterated

enough, the great difficulties that would be encountered in doing so, the turbulence that would be created in fixture certainty, attempting to fulfil club leagues at the same time as Academy Leagues of the same age grades, in a narrowing calender year, all whilst ensuring that any masterplan didn't overburden any age group or leave them with choices of picking between club or county. All of the challenges, hesitations and reservations of reverting back to even age grades, all discussed at length, were acknowledged and sidelined by a greater desire to have a Minor competition, which is the one age group that the gradings debate ultimately hinged upon.

The first quarter of the year entailed navigating through the Ulster Development CCC masterplan to ascertain where an even age grade Fermanagh fixtures schedule could fit in, countless conversations and meetings about the same, increased collaboration with the Academy Structures and the Fermanagh LGFA and endless versions of master-plans and potential calenders later, before a provisional document was published to delegates. Within days of publication, the single round of an U16 League was universally not acceptable and perhaps for the first time, delegates truly understood the great difficulties and uphill battle there would be trying to produce an even age grades masterplan that didn't have overlapping fixtures with the ages either above or below them or didn't compromise the integrity of our competitions or our county teams competing outside Fermanagh.

To accompany the new age grade masterplan, a revised and updated Rules and Regulations document also needed to be produced for the season. For the first time at youth level in Fermanagh, this document incorporated the rules for both codes (football and hurling). A great deal of time and effort went into preparing this document for the delegates to deliberate and discuss. We would like to personally thank the delegates for taking the time to comb through the finest details of the rules and regulations document, offering their wealth of experience and knowledge to help shape and revise the rules, so that we were able to produce an excellent, modern, up to date set of rules and regulations befitting our games.

Despite all of these changes, the season still got started towards the end of March with competitive leagues scheduled for football and hurling at U12, U14, U16 and U18 and championships for U14, U16 and U18 football and U18 hurling. A busy, ambitious and challenging schedule, fraught with obstacles, never too far from another bump in the road and constantly over-stretching, whether it be with referee's or daylight hours.

There have been 465 football fixtures scheduled on servasport this season for our youth and despite all of the hurdles, we still achieved a very respectable 95.25% fulfilment of football fixtures, which was equally as heartening as it was a relief. This figure would in fact be above 97% if we were to exclude the fixtures at U14 and U16 after Roslea unfortunately had to withdraw from both league competitions and conceded the remainder of their fixtures.

Over the last number of seasons we have gradually continued to establish our additional Go Games schedule within the calender. It was abundantly clear towards the end of last year and at the convention, that there was an even greater appetite for more structured games at these lower ages, to commence the fundamental skills along the player pathway earlier. From humble beginnings in 2022 with only 4 dates for two age groups (U7.5 and U9.5), something similar in 2023, to 20 dates in 2024 for 4 age grades (U7.5, U8.5, U9.5 and U10.5), across 35 venues. They truly were a tremendous success.

All clubs in the county were allocated 2 dates in the calender to serve as the hosts for the blitzes, hosting a maximum of 9 visiting clubs for two hours of games. Almost all clubs honoured these dates and took their turn, with two clubs, Coa and Erne Gaels being unable to host on account of weather or ongoing works at the venues. A Microsoft Forms survey was emailed out each Monday for an expression of interest in the upcoming blitz. The surveys worked really well and the blitzes were successful beyond expectation, with almost 1200 small sided games scheduled for the young Gaels in the county. Whilst it was an extra burden of work each week, the benefits were well worth the efforts and I believe we will reap the rewards of this activity in the years to come, with delegates demanding more still!

Congratulations and very well done to all of the teams who have ventured outside the county to provincial and national competitions, Newtownbutler and Kinawley football Féile, Naomh Aodhan for hurling Féile, always representing Fermanagh with great pride and honour. I have no doubt Irvinestown will produce their finest football in the St. Paul's Tournament next month. This year's incredible showcasing of our games, competitiveness & ever-increasing talent, is a credit to each club, coach, volunteer and player in our county. It is always with great thanks and appreciation to them, that we were able to fulfil our fixtures in football and hurling and bring our competitions to successful conclusions.

The addition and inclusion of the hurling masterplan to the football masterplan, both published together at the start of the season, as one collective collaborative Bord na nÓg masterplan, so that both codes can harmoniously exist side by side equally, did indeed become a reality this season and, on paper if nothing else, it had all the hallmarks of an achievable success.

Whilst the administrative issues flagged up in 2023 were greatly improved this season, with the consistent submission of duplicate team-sheets and team registrations, the initial meetings of the hurling development committee were quite hopeful and an ambitious number of teams entering into each competition was heartening.

However, as the competitions commenced and teams began withdrawing or failing to adhere to the fixtures schedule, many other competing interests prevented multiple fixtures reaching their conclusions, greatly diminishing the integrity of the competitions and the 71.75% fixture fulfilment rate was in large part due to an excellent group of U12's. It would be greatly hoped that we can bring this age group up through the age grades, growing from strength to strength into adult hurling.

There were seven U12 teams, seven U14 teams, three U15 Féile teams and five U16 teams. The welcome addition of Cootehill Celtic GAA and East Cavan Gaels to the Fermanagh U14 and U16 competitions definitely bulked up the numbers per competition. However, particularly in the case of East Cavan Gaels, when the hurling age grades started to overlap with similar football age grades in Cavan, they were unable to field and fulfil fixtures, further hindering the successful conclusion of the scheduled games. Whilst at the beginning of the year there was ambitious hope of 8 teams for the small sided games at minor level, once Autumn began this had dwindled to two clubs and an unsustainable competition. A disappointing outcome for the players we hoped, would have some game time before entering adult hurling next year.

In an attempt to afford the Hurling memorial blitzes their rightful place in the masterplan, we have given them their own dedicated dates that we hope will become their annual slot and a date for all clubs to aspire to play in and fulfil. We attempted endlessly to introduce a Go Games Calender, modelled on that of the football. Unfortunately however, there was little or no appetite for this at any age, with the exception of two hurling clubs for the most part and there really were no hurling blitzes fulfilled properly, aside from those that were Memorial Blitzes, which was disappointing. If we are not coaching our fundamentals as early as possible, I fear that there will be no teams to follow the great numbers and interest that there is at U12, which would truly be a travesty.

Comhghairdeas to all this season's football and hurling winners at Minor, U16, Féile, U14 and U12 and our commiserations to the runners up and those who narrowly missed out on the top two spots. The league tables and Championship results for both codes are available below.

The amount of excellent work done by GAA volunteers across Fermanagh is inspirational and often quite humbling. In most cases the commitment, hours, and devotion all too often goes unseen and unnoticed. Every dedicated volunteer is vitally important in shaping our youth for the future, leading by example, providing a safe environment for players to learn, grow, develop, and prosper, not only as players but as individuals.

The County Board owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to all of those clubs who organise their own tournaments, blitzes and competitions throughout the year in addition to the scheduled league, championship and Féile fixtures, notably in football the Gerard Cox Derrygonnelly Tournament, the Tommy Durnien Memorial Tournament, the Hugh Cathcart Kinawley Tournament, Óisín McGovern Teemore Tournament, Paul Bogue Tempo Tournament, Pauric McGovern Tournament Derrylin and in hurling the Joe Maguire Memorial Tournament Ederney, Jim Dundas Memorial Tournament Lisnaskea

and Shane Mulholland Memorial Tournament Lisbellaw. Any tournament or series of games organised over and above the Bord na nÓg schedule, is a credit to the clubs taking the initiative to orchestrate them and only serves to further improve our young, improve their fundamentals across the board and most importantly their enjoyment of our games.

We wish to acknowledge the work of Cumann na mBunscol and the teachers in our schools throughout the county who participate in and promote the Cumann na mBunscol competitions, training our youth and further promoting and enriching our games. I wish to take this opportunity to thank John Prunty, Cumann na mBunscol Secretary for providing an excellent detailed report for the 2024 season and always being an integral link between the Youth Board and Cumann na mBunscol throughout the year.

The tremendous work done by the Fermanagh Competitions Controls Committee headed up by Chairperson John McGovern and CCC Secretary Phil Flanagan is unrivalled. John, Phil and all the CCC members have an exceptionally difficult task orchestrating our annual master plan and trying to accommodate everything. An almost impossible task to please everyone, but John, Phil and the CCC members do an incredible job in the delivery of achievable master plans and often receive more criticism than deserved praise. However, we only ever strive to do our best, to be innovative in what we schedule to deliver and to offer competitive, meaningful games for all ages in the county.

I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank Phil for the tremendous work he does for Fermanagh GAA, the endless and thankless hours put into his role at county level, setting aside the incredible work he does within his own club. I rely on Phil heavily to ensure that the youth masterplan is up to standard and that what the Bord na nÓg is delivering, is befitting the youth in our county and up to standard with the rest of Ulster. No better man to point out a flaw or two, but also no better man to come up with a workable solution.

Phil is an incredible asset, exceptionally knowledgeable and I am very fortunate to have his counsel at my disposal throughout the last few seasons. This season especially, when the new age grade implementation required a whole new rules revision. But through greater collaboration, research and lengthy meetings with delegates, we were able to publish an updated and workable rules and regulations document for 2024. Thank you Phil for your hard work and tireless efforts to advance Fermanagh GAA.

To our Children's Officer, Anita Kehoe, whom co-ordinates with club Children's officers and Designated Officers, keeps on top of our vetting processes, provides safe guarding training and training updates, ensuring that we in Fermanagh GAA are creating and maintaining the safest possible service and environment for our young people, we thank her for her diligence. Anita is always approachable, open minded and highly motivated, in a role that continues to grow in importance and significance. Fermanagh GAA are very lucky to have someone of Anita's calibre in the role. Thankfully, 2024 seen a vast improvement in the issues Anita was dealing with, especially at our lower age grades, with the implementation of silent sidelines in the county. This initiative is to allow our children to just "play" and "enjoy" our games without the negativity from our sidelines. Whilst the concept did take some time to bed in, over time and overall, it was a success and we hope it continues to improve next season as the initiative develops.

Many thanks should be conveyed to our county coaches Pat Cadden, Ultan Kelm, Johnny Garriety, Keith Reilly and the welcome addition of Fionan O'Brien, coaching our games throughout the county

at primary and post-primary level. This coaching is invaluable to our youth and their development. Much credit must go to our county coaches' commitment in continuing to delivering this service along with the additional demands of Academy activities.

Unfortunately, with the vacancies in Fermanagh coaching remaining unfilled, our County Coaches are stretched beyond capacity, what they are expected to achieve and deliver with the limited resources and diminished time frames, versus what is realistically attainable, doesn't match up and their prolonged over-exertion is not sustainable. They need more help and support, they need for Croke Park to legitimately listen to the concerns of the smaller counties and they need the jobs to become more attractive career prospects with competitive salaries accompanying them.

A special word of thanks must go to Teresa McNabb, the Games Development Manager. Teresa does a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes for coaching and games development within Fermanagh, all too often unnoticed and we are so fortunate to have her lead this team of coaches, as professionally and diligently as she does. Another lady who is incredibly busy with Fermanagh GAA commitments, but still manages to immerse herself in club activities and maintain a very busy household. We are so grateful for the time, dedication and selfless commitment you give to this county and the advancement of our games.

I wish to commend Gerard McLaughlin, Hurling Referee Appointments Officer, Fergal Cleary, Football Referee's Appointments Officer and Dermott Love, Referee's Administrator for their difficult jobs in appointing referees to officiate all of our games, often under challenging and strenuous circumstances. Our thanks and gratitude extend to each and every referee this season, who do an incredible and thankless job.

This season the referee's truly went above and beyond, particularly with the addition of officiating the U12 games. We thank them for all of their commitment, dedication and assistance in ensuring that our youth fixtures ran efficiently. It was heartening to see the number of new faces officiating this season, but as always, we need many more referee's in the county and would urge all clubs to consider new individuals to put forward to help the referee's committee. The days of referee's performing their duties at up to three fixtures on one day alone, is not sustainable and shouldn't be acceptable either.

A special word of thanks particularly to Fergal for his diligence in the role this season, always cool, calm and collected in his approach to workable solutions. This was an even more demanding season than 2023, I relied very heavily on Fergal to keep me right, definitely on more than one occasion this year, often spotting conflicts and oversights I hadn't even had the opportunity to see.

Whilst we had much less of an overlap with the Adult Championship fixtures for men and women in 2024 than that of 2023, it was still a few weeks overlapping too many, putting a tremendous amount of strain on our limited number of referees and extra work on ourselves adjusting and refixing whole rounds of games. However, we navigated our way successfully through it all, managing to get all fixtures officiated from U12 through to U18, owing to excellent collaboration between both committees, in particular with Fergal, who dedicates an extraordinary amount of time to his thankless role.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Brian Armitage for his support, confidence, and counsel as Fermanagh County Chairperson. I wish to express my sincere gratitude to County Secretary Tom Boyle and County Treasurer Sean Burns for their continued help, guidance, and encouragement throughout the season. I would like to acknowledge the help of the County PRO Deirdre Donnelly in

trying to ensure that the excellent sporting activities provided for our Gaels, are advertised on our social media platforms and given the recognition that they truly deserve, highlighting the tremendous amount of work that goes on behind the scenes.

I wish to acknowledge the Hurling Development Committee and their new Secretary this year Roísín Smyth. The conversations of the hurling development committee within the county has highlighted a willingness to see the game progress, a keen desire to develop the hurling structures already in place but the small hurling community with a skeleton of highly motivated volunteers within the county is so exhausted and overwhelmed from years of struggling and trying to keep the spark of hurling alive in the county at youth level, that the incredible achievements of the Fermanagh Senior Hurling team definitely kept the fire ignited in their bellies this season. We need many more hurling coaches to step up to the plate.

In conclusion, I would particularly like to thank most sincerely, all club delegates and for their collaboration, patience, understanding and mutual respect throughout the year. Whether begging for pitches, debating gradings, rearranging fixtures (of which there was a considerable amount), or negotiating compromises, your co-operation has always been greatly appreciated. Delegates attending Bord na nÓg meetings is essential in driving our initiatives forward and ensuring that the Bord na nÓg are delivering a programme of games that our players want and our clubs buy into.

We truly value our Youth Delegates very necessary input to our Bord na nÓg meetings, our plans, and our decisions. They are the most important link we have with our clubs and youth players and are a fundamental part of our development as a county, as a whole. We require our Youth Delegates from both football and hurling on board, attending the Bord na nÓg meetings and helping steer our games and initiatives in both codes, developing both codes going forward into 2025 and ensuring a solid grounding for the legacy we wish to leave behind.

Whilst the position of Bord na nÓg Secretary is exceptionally demanding, challenging, frustrating and not always popular as on many occasion this season, it can also be hugely rewarding and inspiring. It is my honour to be in this position now eight years, to do the job we do and to work with the incredible Gaels we have around us sharing the same vision, even if it is at ridiculous o'clock at night and comes at a personal cost to us and indeed our very understanding families. We do it because we love these games, we are passionate about our county and its future and we are proud to be a small part of a very busy and hard working Fermanagh County Board.

I wish at this time to offer my sincere condolences to those families, who have lost loved ones over the course of the season. Ar dheis Dé go raibh said. May they rest in peace. I look forward to once again working with new and returning officers within the county and I am sure I am not alone in looking forward in anticipation to a New Year and a season full of even more fixtures and hopefully less turbulent obstacles and challenges in 2025!

O'Brien I would like to sincerely thank you for all you do in promoting the GAA within our schools, clubs and academies. I also would like to remind delegates that our coaching staff along with their existing roles have taken on additional work in the past 12 - 18 months following the departures of two long serving staff members for which we are very grateful.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to our County Steering Committee of Chairman Brian Armitage, Secretary Tom Boyle, Treasurer Sean Burns and GDM Teresa McNabb whose expertise continues to ensure that we are able to support and develop our coaching staff as well strive to develop coaching and games within the county.

As Coaching Officer, I sincerely thank all those who assisted me in this role for the past number of years. I sincerely wish the newly elected Coaching Officer well in the role and hope that they receive all the help and support that I did.


I am delighted as part of my role as Fermanagh Head of Games to be able to report to Clubs and members the successes and challenges of what has been another busy season.

I will outline the activities that took place during 2024 from a Coaching & Games department.

Schools Programme -

Our Primary and Post Primary Schools Continue to receive a large amount of our time over the school year.

28 Primary Schools received Coaching support and blitz opportunities



Over the school year County Coaches have delivered Football and hurling blocks in ours Primary Schools Programme and organised regional blitzes, this support continues to provide the highest standard of coaching and be a positive experience for pupils, teachers, and schools alike to which I would like to thank our hard-working staff for their professionalism in delivering a safe and fun programme for pupils, encouraging them to attend their Club sessions and keep working hard at their skills. Post-Primary Schools


We continues to work closely with our Post-Primary Schools, support is provided across different areas such as skill development, athletic development, Super Games Programme, Coach Education and team preparation.

St Michaels have also entered a team in the U16.5 Maguire Cup & Sheild in early January 2025.

Congratulations to St Aidan's Derrylin on a fantastic year on the field, U16.5 team winning the MacCormack Cup after a hard battle with Colaiste Feirste Belfast 0:09 points to 0:06 in January, followed by the U15.5 team winning the McEvoy Cup in April and then in May it was the turn of the U13.5 winning the Irish New Ulster shield Final, and their u14.5 girls reached their Ulster final but just came up short on the day.

Super Games



Coaches identified a lack of time and other commitments as barriers to engaging in learning. They said they wanted shorter, more bite-sized learning opportunities. Consequently, a key feature of the new approach is to provide flexible and modular courses. We are excited over the coming months to work closely with National level to be able to offer more opportunities for coaches to learn.

Cul Camps




I must also highlight Croke Park's policy on Cul Camps and approving of Club Camps, these have been circulated a few times over the year and it is important Clubs are aware of them.

Half-time games are always in high demand from Clubs to participate in and for our young stars to watch our Senior intercounty players and then get the opportunity at half-time to try to emulate them.

This season we had 3 NFL & 3 NHL home games, along with Club Championship finals opportunities. Well done to Derrygonnelly Harps and Lisnaskea Emmett's for once again planning and organising the U10.5 tournaments and to all the other clubs who organise invitational tournaments/blitzes, these are important and valuable days for players.

A reminder that all clubs have the responsible to comply to GAA Go Games policy.

We need to ensure we continue to educate our new coaches on Go Games structures and policy, that our youngest players are protected and developed in the right environment.

The Croke Park Activity Day is always the highlight of the year for our young people, well done to all the players and their coaches for making this dream come true for them.

It is important that we continue to look at our Games structure and look at ways to better promotes development in our leagues and championships so that we have competitive and meaningful programme of games.

The logistics of fixture scheduling is an extremely difficult one which involves taking into consideration a lot of other factors and is impossible to be perfect - I commend Phil & Leanne for their ability to put a masterplan together trying to be inclusive and maximise all the possible windows for playing opportunities.

At the forefront of it all we must ensure all our games for our players are challenging and of the highest standard possible and I believe we need to look at additional ways of offering this. National level is keen to explore possible blended games programmes to suit a counties structure, smaller sided games opportunities,

Hurling

Fermanagh Hurling clubs continue to work hard to promote the game and participate in the internal and Tain Og competitions available. The Tain Og structure has been of great benefit to Fermanagh clubs over the last number of years however of late stronger clubs have been entering the competition, leading to development clubs struggling as a result.

We have 8 youth clubs registered however some of these are only able to field at 1 age grade and U8/U10s in a good number of clubs have struggled to participate this season.

There is a need to focus efforts of Coach education support to volunteers within these clubs to encourage more involvement and provide substantial the opportunities for kids to play.

U13 hurling development are a very keen group coaching/playing opportunities, Mid-term break 3 days of coaching to 40+ player. In July (16th, 23rd & 30th) there were U13/U15 Coaching sessions held in Lissan to support players development and these were delivered by Ulster GAA RHDO's.

Setanta Programme ran 3 Fridays in April with 60 players participating, thanks to the clubs for supporting this programme and providing club coaches to support the sessions. 4 dates are being delivered (8th, 15th 29th Nov & 6th Dec) with 40+ players attending. The Setanta Coaching/ Games Programme for 10-13 year olds, allows players from all clubs to attend is open to new players as well. All players are integrated into teams to play games. Thanks to Patrick Delaney for coordinating these sessions and all the club coaches for assisting the smooth running of it.

We are very grateful to The Shane Mulholland Foundation who sponsored U13 Development camp in Lissan in August – this camp was also supported by 'Fermanagh and Omagh Distract Council'. This Camp is always a memorable one, the players receive skills coach, S & C, tactical awareness, player education, intercounty players attending, and each player received a bespoke jersey.

Shaun Donnelly for helping on the final blitz day.

In advanced of the Lory Meagher final and Celtic Challenge final, the senior and minor players held an open training evening in Lissan, meeting young players and signing autographs and taking time for photos.

The County U17 Celtic Challenge squad had a fantastic season winning for the first time the Corn Tom Hogan Cup beating Leitrim in the final. 


County Minor

Hurling Committee

As we look back on the year it is important that we remember how the year started with GAA CCC's recommendation to exclude Fermanagh and other so called weaker counties from the National Hurling League in 2025. Thankfully representatives from our clubs stood together and agreed at our county meeting on the 10th December to oppose this and eventually the correct decision by CCC to drop the proposal was made.

I want to thank all who spoke out and stood up for our current & future hurlers, we may be deemed a weaker county but those who play and promote hurling in Fermanagh do so with the same passion as any other throughout the GAA and therefore should have the same opportunities to shine.

In 2024 the season started with U20's competing early in the year.

The County Minor Hurlers competed in Ulster Development league and the Celtic Challenge and on the 1st June in Ballyshannon the lads where successful in lifting the Celtic Challenge Cup, this being the first time Fermanagh won the competition.

The next day 2nd June we watched with pride as our senior hurlers climbed the steps of the Hogan stand to lift the Lory Meagher Cup it was a great weekend for the players and management of both teams.

In August we went on to see our U15 Development squad win the Hibernia Cup thanks to the players & coaches.

All the work at county & club level by the coaches over the last number of years has built to the success we seen this year and we thank all the coaches who have worked with the teams over the last number of years but most of all we thank the players for their commitment. It would be remiss of me not to mention all the parents/guardian who bring the young players to training, matches throughout the year for club and county, we know that there is a lot of travel thank you all.

Both St.Michael's College and St Aidan's competed in the Ulster Schools competitions and we thank Shaun Donnelly, Frank Hughes in St Michaels and Sean Bradley in St Aidan's for the work they are doing in the schools. St Michaels u15.5 team won the Corn de Dannan in late December this was a first for the school.

Playing hurling in your club is the foundation of it all and there is a small number of hurling coaches who have worked hard throughout 2024 to promote hurling at the grass roots. We had clubs taking part in the Tain Og competition, this was a competition initially set up to promote hurling in the weaker counties, and some feedback this year has been that the original ethos has been lost.

In April the County Feile na ngael competition took place in Derrylin and Enniskillen progressed to represent the county in Wexford in June.

The county league was changed to evens this year we had 7 clubs enter teams in U12, 5 clubs compete in U14's & U16's (including two Cavan clubs). The committee has discussed at length how we should ensure that all the young people who want to play hurling should be given the opportunity. This year

we seen some clubs not able to field at different age groups due to lack of numbers and then further limited due to a maximum of 4 sanctions allowed to a club. This meant that a number of young lads not getting to play hurling at club level. This needs to be addressed if we are to continue to build the foundations of hurling in our county, no player should be left without competitive hurling at club level.

As we know Monday nights is allocated to hurling, throughout the year it was noted that a number of clubs did not abide by this. In order to grow the code we need all clubs to promote hurling in the county and give all players the opportunity to play hurling.

I would like to thank Leanne Prior for her dedication as county youth secretary and for running the fixtures programme. I also wish to thank Teresa McNabb and Patrick Delaney for the promotion of hurling at youth level and for organising of the hurling development programmes/ camps at Easter, Summer and Halloween. We also had the Setanta programme on Friday evenings.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a special thanks to all our hurling clubs & coaches who work tirelessly to develop our game and keep the game going.

As the committee agreed in our first meeting back in January it was vital we all worked together to ensure we give our young people have the opportunity to hurl, as a committee we can only ensure that if we work together at all levels.

Referees' Administration Committee

Introduction

I would like to begin this report by thanking the referees within the County for their efforts and commitment during the 2024 season and members of CCC who have provided consistent support to referees during the season. There are various aspects to refereeing and the brief seems to be changing every year and with another plethora of rule changes on the horizon, 2025 will produce more challenges.

Training

For those who are unaware, all referees MUST complete PSNI/Garda vetting, safeguarding training, Rules test and fitness tests before stepping onto a pitch. These are the minimum standards as indicated by Croke Park and I'm pleased to report the Fermanagh panel of referees meet these standards. We have secured the services of some new Assessors this year which has allowed us to provide independent feedback to all referees and the mentoring programme for new referees is continuing.

Games

It's our aim that games are shared equally between clubs and referees and with this in mind CCC in association with the referees committee have indicated that every club should cover 3.0% of games. The table below is an indication of how this has evolved during the season and it's clear that some clubs are carrying an excessive workload. The only club falling below the threshold was Teemore and I'm hopeful this issue will be addressed before the start of the 2025 season. Although Erne Gaels also fell below the level this was primarily due to Niall Cullens inter County commitments. It's a credit to Fermanagh referees and particularly our Appointments Officer (Fergal Cleary) that nearly 800 games were covered in Fermanagh this year, this includes a 30% increase in youth games from previous seasons.

Championship

The County Championship format this year was again highly successful but came at a cost to referees. The logistics around providing 4 officials for some championship games on the same day and at different locations can be challenging. Again, I would like to thank the referees for their commitment and diligence during this period. On reflection of the Championship referees found the most difficult aspect was securing umpires for their respective games. I understand that refereeing isn't for everyone, but I urge clubs to do more to support your referee and put in an effort to secure a team of umpires.

Referees are currently getting more support for their umpiring duties from their refereeing peers rather than their own club. So much coverage is rightly directed to the "respect" campaign, but I can confirm that sending numerous text messages or making phone calls hours before a game trying to secure a final umpire is every bit as stressful has been challenged on the football pitch.

The Championship format was overall a great opportunity for referees, and we had the opportunity to officiate in highly competitive games which will benefit all aspects of Fermanagh football going forward. This season the Senior championship final required a replay to separate the teams and this gave an opportunity to two referees, both equally competent and at different stages of their respective careers. Congratulations to Nigel Sweeney and Eoin Murphy who contributed to the spectacle and

excitement of both matches.

Hurling

Hurling continues to develop within Fermanagh and once again referees are playing their part. I would like to thank the hurling referees for their continued commitment to hurling within the county. The referees are now extending themselves further and have been officiating at provincial level (Gerry McLaughlin & Michael Keown) which once again illustrates their commitment to the progression of the game. Fermanagh had 40 scheduled hurling matches last season and although that figure is small in comparison to other counties the growth should in the last few years is a credit to all involved.

National Level

Fermanagh has a small panel of referees and yet continues to generate quality officials who excel at National Level. Niall Cullen has been representing his County and club with great aplomb in recent years and was once again retained on the National League panel for 2024. Eoin Murphy and James Lewis are included within the Provincial panel for 2024 and we wish Niall, James, and Eoin well in the future and we hope that others can see the opportunities that can be availed of.

Ladies Football

Ladies football in Fermanagh is thriving and once again referees are playing their part. We are again talking about the same group of people, nearly half the current refereeing panel are doubling up to referee ladies' football. This again demonstrates the commitment of the current panel where they have additional rules to learn notwithstanding the continuing pressures of time and other resources.

I would urge all clubs to encourage some more ladies take up refereeing, especially those who have recently retired from the game, their experience of ladies' football should be retained.

Recruitment

Refereeing isn't easy, it is physically and mentally demanding, but it is rewarding. The refereeing committee have tried numerous approaches to recruit referees with some limited success but regrettably the most successful method of recruitment is proving to be the threat of removing home games. This approach is by no means favoured but clubs must realise that referees (like footballers) have a shelf life.

30% of the current refereeing panel are over 50 years of age and clubs need to prepare for their inevitable retirement, so please be proactive, help your club and county and take recruitment seriously. I will remind all clubs that all referees must complete PSNI/Garda vetting, this is the responsibility of the referee and their respective club. Many thanks to the efforts of clubs who have provided new referees this season Roslea (Martin McClave), Aghadrumsee (Gerry Grew), Belnaleck (Aaron Quigley), Maguiresbridge (Mattie Teague). Four new referees in Fermanagh within one year is an excellent result in comparison to previous years, I hope this development continues.

Conclusion

This year has proved once again, difficult for Referees and although recent initiatives such as "silent sidelines" has been a good forward step, we are still well short of an acceptable standard with regards to player and supporter behaviour. There are however many positive moments, matches and events and it's important to focus on this. I would finally, on behalf of the Refereeing Panel thank everyone for their kindness and support during the 2024 season especially the members of CCC who work tirelessly on our behalf.

Lissan - Pitch Usage

Overall, both pitches held up well throughout the season, however this was mainly due to reducing the usage in February and March, otherwise both would have been unplayable. The inter county season lasts 9 months, the majority of all county squads training and preparation takes place in the six-month period from November to April and eases of from May to July.

The downside of the initial six-month block is no growth so maintaining a grass surface is a challenging process with only two pitches which are overrun, Joe Prunty is key to helping us maintain a good surface and many thanks to him for his advice and help.

New LED Floodlights

With help from the Ulster Council, we were successful in obtaining a grant to install a new set of LED lights for the top pitch at Lissan, these should be operational by February

Gym

We increased the size of the gym to comfortably accommodate a full intercounty squad and now have a fantastic 2,500 sqft gym facility fully kitted out.

Wind Turbine

The new wind turbine has been installed at Lissan by Conrick Power, we are in the process of negotiating a new pricing structure with Conrick Power

Lissan Overview

Lissan can now facilitate all our intercounty squad requirements on one site from training, meeting, eating plus strength and conditioning

St Michaels Partnership

To alleviate the chronic shortage of access to pitches we entered into a partnership agreement with St Michaels which involved the resurfacing of their pitch, we also intend to re purpose the lights from Lissan. The pitch shall be shared between all county teams and St Michaels.

New Development at Ashwood's Road, Enniskillen

We are delighted to announce we have sale agreed to the purchase of 25 acres on the Ashwood's Road in Enniskillen subject to approval by Croke Park. This ambitious project aims to increase training facilities for county teams both male and female plus development squads for football and hurling. It is a commitment to the growth and prosperity of the county that continues to build and shape a bright future for our county. At last year's AGM we made aware that further land to develop more pitches at Lissan would not be possible and we had taken the decision to follow a twin site strategy and we would aim to source 20 plus acres on the edge of Enniskillen to develop this site. Lissan is always going to be a key part of our facilities infrastructure and to replace it would cost £2m unfortunately there is no land available to further develop pitches at the site. Central to our thinking is the future amalgamation of the GAA and the LGFA and how we as a county can accommodate the need for both organisations. The new site when complete shall accommodate 3 pitches, county offices car parking and a pitch to host competitive matches. Including Lissan and St Michaels this will allow us access to six grass pitches. A key advantage with this site is that it allows us to plan for elements we could

never achieve at Lissan, plus it leaves a footprint for both us and all future generations to work and build on. We won't achieve this in a few years but we now have the land and location to really dream and set the first steps towards all that we need and it will take generations of Fermanagh Gaels to achieve this. An overnight success takes 10 - 20 years. A small dedicated group have shown great resilience to achieve this important stepping stone for the county namely Seamus McMahon, Lauri McCusker, Sean Burns. No project like this is achieved without the local knowledge to help locate the site and financial support of likeminded Fermanagh Gaels to help secure it. A few individuals who wish to remain anonymous have been very exceptionally supportive and without their help it would simply not be happening, a huge thankyou to these Gaels.

Our strategy is to develop the site in Phases –

Phase 1: 5 Years 2025 - 2030

- Two Full Size Sand Grass Training Pitches Floodlighting, Fencing & Catch Nets
- One pitch to host competitive matches with adjoining meeting and changing facilities, Strength
 & Conditioning Performance Hub
- Car & Coach Parking, initial outline works

Phase 2: Years 2030 - 2035

 Aim to host games club championship games, Sports Pavilion and stand, 4 sets of changing rooms Multi-Purpose Hall, Meeting Rooms, Office Accommodation, Kitchen, Treatment/ Physio Rooms, Toilets

Funding Sources

We are currently in talks with Croke Park for grant aid plus Fermanagh and Omagh District Council and Club Eirne

Brewster Park

We were awarded a grant of £30k from Sport Northern Ireland towards the relocation and upgrade of the accessible viewing platform in the John Vesey stand.

Ulster Council Grant

In partnership with Enniskillen Gaels, we applied to Ulster Council's Capital Infrastructure Grants Scheme for:

- Full replacement of the roof on the John Vesey stand Complete
- Upgrade of male and female toilets that service the John Vesey stand Complete in 2025 We were awarded £125k, and the roof has now been replaced, and we are in the process of upgrading the toilets. Many thanks to Enniskillen Gaels for their cooperation on this project.

Club Loans

Croke Park launched their club development loan fund this year, congratulations to all the clubs who were successful.

These efforts underscore the GAA's commitment to empowering its members through knowledge, support, and leadership.



1. Role Induction Webinars

The induction webinars have become an integral part of the GAA's strategy to seamlessly transition new officers into their roles while refreshing the knowledge of current officers. These webinars aim to create a baseline of competence and confidence among club leaders.

Key Features of the Webinars:

- Content Breakdown: Sessions include modules on governance, financial management, member engagement, and strategic leadership. Detailed explanations are provided to help officers understand how to document meeting minutes effectively, prepare budgets, and engage with members to foster a sense of belonging.

B. Club Compás Programme

Tuarascáil Oifigeach na bPáistí -Children's Officer Report

As part of the remit of a County Children's Officer, a report has to be prepared for our Annual Convention.

Where we are in 2024?

- All clubs have a vetted Children's Officer in place.
- All clubs now have a Designated Officer in place.
- All clubs have their National Child Safeguarding statements displayed in all clubrooms/club areas
- Vetting and Safeguarding information is now available via Foireann (this is still a work in progress, some details are still missing clubs should follow up on this with Ulster GAA)
- Delivery of 18 face-to-face Safeguarding Level 1 courses across Fermanagh. Lists of attendees emailed to all clubs. A sincere thank you to all clubs and participants.
- Delivery of a Safeguarding Level 1 course exclusively for referees in Fermanagh which was well attended.
- Vetting via Access (NI) moved to online application to save time and allow applicants to take ownership of their vetting. General consensus is that this is more "user friendly" but some issues still persist.
- Last year I commented on the need to have parents behind the perimeter of the pitch at U11.5 games. This year has seen a considerable drop in complaints at U12 grade and below. That does not mean it has completely disappeared, but maybe the message is getting through that verbal abuse of underage players and others is unacceptable. Again, I would like to stress that any of these measures are not put in place due to the behaviour of the children taking part in our games...
- However, I am concerned at the number of reports of adults entering the field of play at other games, particularly at U14 and U18 level. Clubs need to be proactive in ensuring pitch-side access is not available to individuals who are not involved in teams. It is better to be proactive to a potential problem that having to be reactive to it.
- Roll out of the Ulster GAA "One Punch" campaign ongoing, and clubs will work with Maura McMenamin to ensure its roll-out to underage players and coaches.

Legal Requirements

All club executives, underage coaches, Children's Officers and our Child Safeguarding Tutors have roles to play in the delivery of the code. Our daily practices will continue to remain our central focus and we must continue to legally implement our comprehensive Code of Behaviour.

Please be mindful that those within our clubs who are selected to work with Children must have mandatory requirements:

- 1. The must have attended the Gaelic Games Child Safeguarding Workshop.
- 2. They must be vetted through Access NI.
- 3. They must possess a minimum foundation coaching qualification received from GAA.

If someone refuses to complete these, you'd need to ask the question 'why'? And if they are suitable to have working with young people in your club.

Planning ahead for 2025

2025 shall be a year to build on the foundations set in place over the past few years and the plan shall

include:

- Clubs appointing Children's Officers as per club constitutions.
- Clubs appointing Designated Officers as per club constitutions.
- Clubs appointing a Hearings Committee (who review any alleged breaches of the code) as per club constitutions.
- Continued use of gaa.ie Children's Officers email addresses through clubs, meaning that information that needs to go directly to club Children's Officers can do so via designated email addresses.
- Ensure that Vetting is ongoing in all clubs throughout 2025
- Ensure clubs access the face-to-face Safeguarding Level 1 training where needed.
- Delivery of Safeguarding Level 2 Training for club Childrens Officers, and Safeguarding Level 3 Training for club Designated Officers to be organised for Fermanagh clubs in early spring. This will be delivered and certified by Ulster Council and is to be renewed every three years.
- Clubs to ensure roll out at club level of the Ulster GAA "One Punch" campaign.
- Clubs are asked to continue to keep parents behind the perimeter of pitches, and to be mindful of who gains access to their pitches during Gaelic games activities.

Thanks

Finally, in closing, a sincere 'thank you' to our County Chairman Brian Armitage, County Secretary Tom Boyle, Vice Chairman John McGovern, CCC Secretary Phil Flanagan, Hearings Secretary Martin McBrien, PRO Deirdre Felloni, Youth Secretary Leanne Prior, Coaching Officer Fearghal O'Connor, GDM Teresa McNabb and the county coaching team, for their strong support in what we want to achieve. I thank all members of our Determing and Hearings Committee. Not an easy task, thankfully not over-used, but they continue to play a vital role in ensuring the Code of Behaviour is upheld.

To the Clubs of Fermanagh and their Children's Officers, to Ulster Council, especially Head of Safeguarding Bernie Fox and the newly appointed Safeguarding Manager Ciara McGrory, and to our National Children's Officer Michelle Harte, I extend my heartfelt thanks.

To Conclude

I commend those clubs who have introduced new initiatives this year, such as their own club easter and summer camps or parish leagues to name but a few. These initiatives breath fresh life into underage structures and give our young players such positive experiences and happy memories. Well done! When I deliver Safeguarding Courses, I am reminded of why we want our young people to play our games. We want our underage players to benefit from and participate in our Gaelic Games in a safe and enjoyable environment where our Games are conducted in a spirit of fair play.

It is not just the responsibility of the Children's Officer to ensure our young people are safe. It is the responsibility of all involved in our association. When it becomes an integral part of the clubs' ethos, then we become a welcoming and safe environment, where young people will thrive. Most of the clubs in Fermanagh are doing just that and continue to provide our young people with a positive experience. It is such a privilege for me to travel around our clubs and see first-hand the excellent work that is ongoing. Well done to you all.

Tuarascáil an Choiste Coiste Sláinte agus Folláine -Health & Wellbeing Committee Report

While the GAA will always be primarily known as one of the world's leading amateur sports organisations, our members and our communities remain at the heart of all we do.

Of course, county and club units already do so much in the area of promoting healthy lifestyles and communities and we in the county health and wellbeing committee are working hard to ensure that all available supports and structures are in place, so as to maximise the GAA's potential in this area.



We have continued to promote health and wellbeing in our clubs and communities with a variety of activities. The county committee continued to support clubs in the promotion of health and wellbeing in our players, members and wider community.

The following were our key objectives at the start of the year and how fulfilled them.

Action Area 1 - Continued Development of Health and Wellbeing Structures

During the year we have continued to develop lines of communication with the Healthy Club Officers the majority of clubs in Fermanagh have appointed a healthy club officer. We are continuing to develop lines of communication with all clubs and promote health and wellbeing activity on the county website, where we have links to national and provincial sites as well as links to the GAA e-learning site. We have also downloadable guidelines and resources for clubs. We can also showcase what is happening around the county at club level. Clubs are being encouraged to let us know what they are doing so we can start to show it on the website.

We report to county board meetings about our activity, as well as using the website and social media through the county PRO. I would like to take this opportunity to especially thank Deirdre Felloni, County PRO, for their assistance throughout the year. The committee is also represented at all Ulster council meetings as well as national level to ensure that Fermanagh's voice is heard at all levels and has the full support of both Maura McMenamin at Ulster council and Colin Regan in Croke Park, as well as the provincial and National Health and Wellbeing Committees. Biannual reports are submitted to the National Health and Wellbeing Committee outlining the work in Fermanagh.



Action Area 2 - Support Growth, Development and progression of HCP

Training for Healthy club officers was delivered by online by the community and health department in Croke Park.

I am pleased to report that 13 clubs in Fermanagh are continuing their journey as part of the healthy club project aiming for either foundation, silver or Gold awards and congratulations to; Belcoo O'Rahilly and Tempo Maguires for joining in Phase 7. We would encourage all clubs to consider becoming part of the heatlhy club project. The county continues to be represented at provincial and national level events, and members of the committee attended

the County Health and Wellbeing forum in Croke Park in November.

Action Area 3 - Support Critical Incident Response.

A county critical incident plan was developed and was adopted by the county board and is available to view on the county website health and wellbeing page. This plan will be updated following the county convention. I am grateful for the support from the county management committee and the county board for their continued support in this. We are actively encouraging clubs to adopt their own critical incident response plan as soon as possible if they have not already done so.

Unfortunately throughout the year some clubs have had reason to utilise these. If any club wishes to discuss their CIRP or developing one they can contact me via email or phone and we will support them in developing their own critical incident response plan.

Action Area 4 - Plan and Deliver Community and Health Activities

We continue to link with local health and wellbeing organisations and charities throughout the county and through these contacts we have been able to carry out health and wellbeing campaigns throughout the year at national league matches and club championship, on Mental health awareness with action mental health, Breast and testicular cancer awareness and road safety as well as other campaigns. We have continued to work with the official county charity partner – Friends of the Cancer Society – in promoting cancer awareness and fund raising at the county finals.



While the GAA community can offer a supporting environment, it is only through the assistance of medical professionals and service providers, such as the Samaritans, that the appropriative help can be sought. In each club, the Healthy Club Officer will act as the link with the County Health & Wellbeing Committee and will be the point of contact within the club for any relevant activities. They will also be the person that the county committee will liaise with in relation to Health & Wellbeing. This may be an opportunity for clubs to involve someone not previously associated with the GAA but who have an interest in health and wellbeing and could then become a member of the club.

They will not, be expected to become a counsellor for the club but they should have an interest in the area of health and have a willingness to drive this agenda in their club. As each club holds its AGM and the Health and Wellbeing Officer is appointed or reappointed we would ask each club to send contact details to the committee using the official email address: chair.hwc.fermanagh@gaa.ie so that lines of communication can be maintained. Please forward this information even if the person has not changed as phone numbers and email addresses can change.

Looking forward to 2025 and beyond we hope to maintain and improve communication with clubs. We hope to continue to raise the profile of the committee within the county and the important work being done by clubs around the county. Following guidance from National Health and Wellbeing Committee we hope to continue to develop the health and wellbeing structures within the county. Our focus will be on supporting the healthy club project. I will report any developments to the county board. We continue to showcase the good work done in Fermanagh at provincial and national level.

In 2025 we will meet early in the year to develop a plan for the year being aware that there may well be constraints on what we can do.

Mental health will continue to be a big part of our work and we are aiming to forge links with, and work in partnership with the many excellent statutory, voluntary and community services that are

out there, and better enable them to gain access to our members and promote good mental health among our communities. We are also hoping to roll out the one punch campaign in the county.

We can also do a lot of good work in just encouraging people, particularly our young boys and men, to seek help when it is required and to help in tackling the stigmas that often prevent people from reaching out to others. We have to stress the message that "It's Ok not to feel Ok".

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank the county management committee and the county board for their continuing support in delivering our objective and place on record my thanks to the members of the committee, for their work on the committee and all the healthy club officers for their work this year.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank; County Chairman Brian Armitage, Secretary Tom Boyle, Treasurer Sean Burns, Vice Chairman John McGovern and PRO Deirdre Felloni for their support and assistance and just end by leaving a brief but essential check-list for clubs.

Tuarascáil an Chisteora -Treasurer's Report

A Chairde Go leir

I am glad to present to you my treasurers report for the year ended 30/09/2024.

It has been a difficult year financially. Preparation of all our football and hurling teams from development squads through to senior has seen increasing costs in provision of playing gear, pitch hire and maintenance, food and medical/physio cover. The standardisation of salaries for coaching staff through the C & G HR plan initiated by Croke Park has also added cost to the county. Whilst income from our championships and commercial income has remained steady I believe there is a need for a dedicated person to pursue commercial opportunities given the extended county season.

Whilst the GAA central finance have tweaked the national league share for smaller counties I believe they must do more to address the imbalance between the larger counties which have wide opportunities for commercial income and the smaller ones who despite loyal support from a limited number of sponsors, will never be able to match their larger neighbours.

There is ever increasing demand for training facilities for our teams and whilst our two pitches at Lissan have been used to the maximum, we are also grateful for the cooperation of schools, clubs and the council in making their facilities available at peak times. Extensive activity by our development committee has ensured that we are very close to confirming the acquisition of land upon which it is planned to develop 3 pitches and office, meeting room and gym facilities.

I thank all our sponsors and in particular our main sponsors Tracey Concrete Ltd, Mannok, Monaghan Bros, O Neills, Modern Tyres, Mc Mahon Healthcare, Beltertech, Westville Hotel, Crust and Crumb, Cadco, B Mc Caffrey and Sons and Peter Carty.

Club Eirne again provide essential funds to keep facilities maintained to a high standard and a planned relaunch of Club Eirne's membership recruitment had been delayed in the hope that it would coincide with the announcement of a successful land acquisition. However we cannot delay this any longer and Gerard Treacy, chairperson of Club Eirne, will address this in his report.

Once again, I am indebted to our loyal group of gate-people who turn up week after week in all weathers to ensure we maximise gate income. It is essential that we have new volunteers to assist those already helping.

Fermanagh have again this year provided the opportunity to pay cash at championship games but thankfully approx. 90% of patrons are now purchasing their tickets online. This situation will have to be looked at again by the incoming finance committee as the switch to online ticketing has taken place in the vast majority of counties with positive financial outcomes.
