

Buanorduithe na Comhdhála (Standing Orders for Convention)

In order that the proceedings of the Convention are carried out without delay, the following Standing Orders will be observed:

- 1. The proposer of a motion may not speak for more than five minutes.
- 2. A delegate speaking on a motion may not speak for more than three minutes.
- 3. The proposer of a motion may speak for a second time for three minutes before a vote is taken.
- 4. No delegate may speak a second time in the debate on the same motion.
- 5. The Chairperson may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- 6. A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairperson, move 'that the question be now put', after which when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- 7. When Convention considers it appropriate, a vote may be by secret ballot.
- 8. A speaker to the Secretary's Report/Sub Committee Reports or to any other general discussion shall not exceed three minutes on any one topic.
- The Chairperson may consider any matter not on the Clár with the consent of the majority of the delegates present and voting.

MOTION 1

CLG Mhic Uidhir, An t-Iompú Deiseal

Amend Rule 6.15 Official Guide Part 1 to:

The All-Ireland Senior & Minor Finals shall be played in Croke Park. The Finals shall be played on or before the last Sunday in July on dates determined by the Central Council, with the All-Ireland Minor Football & Hurling Finals to be played immediately prior to their respective Senior Finals. In exceptional circumstances the Central Council may make other arrangements.

Na Moltaí Don Choiste Chontae

(Recommendations to County Committee)

RECOMMENDATION 1

CLG Naomh Pádraig, Domhnach

A player changing from first 11 to Reserve football is not eligible for the next two matches at Reserve level regardless of competition.

Exception: If the player changing from the first 11 hasn't participated in the previous two Senior matches, either as a starting or substitute player, then they are eligible to play the next reserve match.

RECOMMENDATION 2 (MUTUALLY EXCLUSIVE TO AMENDMENT 1)

CLG Naomh Pádraig, Domhnach

A player changing from first 11 to Reserve football is not eligible for the next match at Reserve level regardless of competition.

Exception: If the player changing from the first 11 hasn't participated in the previous two Senior matches, either as a starting or substitute player, then they are eligible to play the next reserve match.

RECOMMENDATION 3

CLG Ghaeil Inis Ceithleann

To facilitate clubs, their players and their families:

A 10 day holiday period is included in the Fermanagh senior club fixtures. This period will start on the Saturday of the 2nd Weekend of July until the Monday after the 3rd weekend of July (inclusive). During this period, no club adult fixtures will take place.

Fodhlíthe Choiste Chontae Fhear Manach CLG

(Fermanagh GAA Bye-Laws)

To be Read in Conjunction with the Official Guide and the GAA Official Codes

1 COUNTY CONVENTION

(1) The Annual County Convention, convened in accordance with Rule 3.8 T.O., shall elect the following Officers in accordance with Rule 3.9 T.O., following nominations received in accordance with Rule 3.11 T.O.:

- Chairperson;
- Vice-Chairperson;
- Assistant Secretary;
- Treasurer;
- Assistant Treasurer;
- Coaching Officer;
- Officer for Irish Language and Culture; and
- Communications Officer. Public Relations Officer

(2) It shall further appoint the following Officers, in accordance with Rule 3.11 T.O., following recommendation by the outgoing County Committee:

- · Planning and Training Officer;
- Demographics Officer;
- · Health & Well Being Officer; and
- Children's Officer.

(3) It shall further elect two representatives on Provincial Council and one representative on Central Council, who shall hold office respectively for the term of the ensuing Provincial and Central Councils.

(4) It shall elect delegates, in accordance with Rule 3.10 T.O., to include the County Chairperson and County Secretary, when available, to

- Annual Congress; and
- Provincial Convention.

(5) The County Management Committee shall act as the Standing Orders Committee for County Convention and shall examine motions submitted and decide whether these are in order. The Standing Orders Committee may put a motion in order where there is a failure to quote any or the appropriate rules affected, where there are minor clerical errors, or may classify the Motion as a Motion, a Bye-law, an amendment to a Bye-Law, a Recommendation to County Committee or a Regulation. Clubs shall be advised in writing, in advance of Convention, of the reason for the amendments being made.

(6) When a motion, bye-law or amendment(s) to same, or proposed regulation change is received by the County Secretary before the specified closing date and is found to be out of order, the County Secretary shall contact the proposing club and advise them of same, with a brief outline of the reason(s) why it is out of order. It will then be up to the relevant club to correct the motion, if so desired, and to re-submit it by a date given by the County Secretary in order to be included. Only the

correction of motions submitted on time will be allowed in this process – no new motions can be submitted.

(7) In the case of all motions passed at County Convention (or at County Committee, in the case of Regulations) which involve an amendment or change of Bye-laws or Regulation, the Standing Orders Committee shall have authority to examine such motions and, without derogating from their meaning, recommend any re-phrasing, re-location or re-classification considered necessary. Such recommendations shall be put before the County Committee for ratification at its first meeting after Convention before being forwarded to Central Council for approval if such approval is required.

2 COUNTY COMMITTEE

- (1) The County Committee shall consist of the following:
- (a) Officers: Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Coaching Officer, Officer for the Irish Language and Culture and Communications Public Relations Officer:
- (b) Central Council Representative (who shall be ex-officio);
- (c) Two Provincial Council Representatives (who shall be ex-officio);
- (d) Children's Officer:
- (e) Planning and Training Officer;
- (f) Demographics Officer;
- (g) Safety and Facilities Officer;
- (h) Named Hurling Committee Representative;
- (i) County Referees Administrator;
- (j) Two representatives from each affiliated club named on nomination form issued for County Convention, subject to rule 3.16 (g) T.O;
- (k) Named County Primary Schools Committee Representative;
- (I) Named County Post-Primary Schools Committee Representative;
- (m) Named County GAA Handball Committee Representative;
- (n) Named Fermanagh Ladies Gaelic Football Association Representative;
- (o) Named Fermanagh Camogie Association Representative.
- (2) The positions detailed above (with the exception of a Full Time County Secretary appointed under Rule 3.17 (f) T.O.) in paragraphs (a) to (c) shall be elected at the Annual County Convention as per Rules 3.8, 3.9 and 3.10 T.O..
- (3) The positions detailed above in paragraphs (d) to (f) shall be appointed at the Annual County Convention on the recommendation of the outgoing County Committee as per Rule 3.11 T.O..
- (4) The positions detailed above in paragraphs (g) to (o) shall be appointed by the County Committee.
- (5) All members of the County Committee, with the exception of a Full Time County Secretary appointed under Rule 3.17 (f) T.O., and positions detailed in paragraphs 2 (1) (m) to (o) shall have full voting rights.
- (6) As permitted by Rule 3.9 (b) Exception (2) T.O., the County Treasurer and County Children's Officer are not subject to the maximum period of five years in office.

(7) Proxies may be appointed for the two named representatives of each affiliated club. Proxies are also allowed for representatives of (k), (l), (m), (n) and (o) provided they are officers of their respective committees.

3 SUB-COMMITTEES

(1) In accordance with Rule 3.18 T.O. and subject to Rule 3.19 T.O., the County Committee shall appoint the following sub-committees whose powers and functions shall be as detailed therein and in these Bye-Laws, where appropriate:

All members of sub-committees shall be named.

Where a quorum for meetings is not stated in these Bye-Laws, Rule 4.2 T.O. shall apply.

(i) Management Committee

It shall consist of the following officers of the County Committee:

Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Coaching Officer, Officer for Irish Language and Culture, and Communications Public Relations Officer, and in addition the Planning and Training Officer, Safety and Facilities Officer, Demographics Officer, the Children's Officer, the Named Hurling Committee Representative, the Central Council representative and the two Provincial Council representatives.

(ii) Competitions Control Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the Vice Chairperson of the County Committee), Rúnaí (who shall be the Assistant Secretary of the County Committee) and not fewer than six other named members, along with the Fixtures Analyst and the County Referees' Administrator (who shall be entitled to vote only on the appointment of Referees), all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

The Competitions Control Committee shall have plenary powers, except in matters pertaining to Grading of clubs and players within the county.

(iii) Fixture Analysts

At least one Fixtures Analyst shall be appointed by the County Committee, on the recommendation of the County Management Committee and whose functions shall be as outlined in Rule 3.18 (iii), T.O..

(iv) Hearings Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than five other named members all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(v) Safety and Facilities Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Safety and Facilities Officer) and Rúnaí and not fewer than five other named members, to include a qualified Event Controller, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(vi) Planning and Training Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Planning and Training Officer) and Rúnaí and not fewer than five other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County

Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(vii) Referees' Administration Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than five other named members, one of whom shall be the County Referees' Administrator, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(viii) Coaching and Games Development Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Coaching Officer) and Rúnaí (who shall be the County Head of Games Development Manager) and not fewer than five other named members, one of which shall be the Children's Officer, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(ix) Cultural Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Officer for Irish Language and Culture) and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(x) Communications Public Relations/Marketing Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Communications Public Relations Officer) and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(xi) Youth Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

The County Youth Committee may hold an Annual Forum each year and it may make recommendations to the County Competitions Control Committee on matters relating to underage competitions within the County.

(xii) Finance Sub-Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Treasurer) and Rúnaí (who shall be the County Assistant Treasurer) and not fewer than five other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(xiii) Information Technology Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(xiv) County Teams Management and Panels Sub-Committee

The membership of the County Teams' Management and Panels' Committee shall be as outlined in the Charter for County Committee / Player relationships and as approved by Ard Chomhairle from time to time and shall be appointed by the County Committee, on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(xv) Audit and Risk Committee

It shall consist of no more than five members including a Chairperson nominated by the Management Committee and approved by the Provincial Audit and Risk Committee; and up to four other members nominated by the Management Committee. The Treasurer shall not be a member.

(xvi) Demographics Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach (who shall be the County Demographics Officer) and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(xvii) Health and Well-being Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

(2) In accordance with Rule 3.17 (m) 16 (l), T.O., the County Committee shall appoint the following sub-committees, whose functions shall be as outlined in these Bye-Laws:

(i) Strategic Implementation Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee. This Committee shall be responsible for overseeing the implementation of a County Strategic Plan and the elements of the Provincial and National Strategic Plans that relate to the county.

(ii) Hurling Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than four other named members, all of whom shall be appointed by the County Committee on the recommendation of the County Management Committee.

The Hurling Committee shall be entitled to make proposals in relation to the format of all hurling competitions to the Competitions Control Committee and on matters relating to the promotion and improvement of hurling within the county to the County Coaching & Games Development Committee. The Hurling Committee may hold an Annual Forum.

(iii) Post-Primary Schools Committee

It shall consist of a Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí and not fewer than three other named members, including a member of the County Management Committee, a representative from each affiliated Post-Primary School and a representative from the County Coaching & Games Development Committee.

The Post-Primary Schools Committee shall be responsible for the promotion, development and control of games in Post-Primary Schools; for the organisation of games, where appropriate, and to encourage as wide a participation in Gaelic games as is feasible.

(3) Except in the case of the County Hearings Committee and the County Competitions Control Committee, the County Chairperson and County Secretary shall be ex-officio members of all subcommittees.

4. PLAYING ELIGIBILITY/TRANSFERS

As the Gaelic Athletic Association is community centred, based on the allegiance of its members to their local Clubs and Counties, the Transfer and Declaration Rules in the Official Guide and in these Bye-Laws reflect that ethos. A player is considered to owe allegiance and loyalty to his First Club, as defined in Rule 6.3 T.O. and in these Bye-Laws.

(1) Attachment to First Club

A person seeking to become a member of the Association shall have a limited choice e.g. to joining either a Club in the Catchment area of his permanent residence or a Club with which he has a "relevant connection" as defined in Rule 6.2 (b) T.O..

(2) Permanent Residence

- (a) Permanent residence, in the context of this Bye-law and Rules 6.3 and 6.4 T.O. shall mean residing at a fixed address for a minimum period of one month prior to the date of the transfer application.
- (b) The onus of proof of residence rests with the member seeking the transfer. Where proof of residence has not been established to the satisfaction of the County Competitions Control Committee, it shall be empowered to investigate the evidence of the member seeking the transfer, and where such evidence is found to be false, the member shall be liable to be dealt with under Rule 7.2 (e), T.O..
- (c) For a player, up to and including Minor level, residence shall be considered to be the permanent residence of his Parent(s)/Guardian(s).
- (3) Official Transfer Forms, which provide for the signature of the Transferee and the Secretary of the club to which the member wishes to join, shall be used for all transfer applications within the county.
- (4) Applications for Transfer to leave a First Club (within the County) as defined in Rule 6.3 T.O. shall not be granted, except in the following cases:
- (a) A player whose residence/ family residence is changed to the catchment area of the club to which he wishes to be transferred.
- (b) A change of address is not required in the case of a player whose residence/ family residence is already in the area of the club to which he wishes to be transferred, and who is presently a member of a club which is outside the club area of his residence.
- (5) No transfer shall be granted unless it is properly before the meeting.
- (6) Any player wishing to transfer from one Club to another within the County, shall make application between 09:00 on January 1st and 23:59 on March 31st (inclusive).

Exception to (6): A player who has not played with a club for 96 weeks may apply for a transfer at any time during a year, provided the application for transfer is in order and complies with (2) – (5) above.

(7) All applications for transfer are to be submitted to the County Secretary. The County Secretary shall pass all applications received to the Competitions Control Committee, which shall notify clubs

from which transfers are sought.

- (8) In accordance with Rule 6.4 (c), (e), T.O., the Competitions Control Committee shall process and decide on all applications for transfer within the jurisdiction of Coiste Contae Fhear Manach.
- (9) A transfer request is primarily a matter between a player and the County Committee. When a player signs a transfer request form, his current Club has no right to delay or refuse permission for this request. If the Club has a valid reason as to why a player may not be granted a transfer, its duty is to state such reason, quoting the applicable rules, to the County Secretary, who will relay this information to the County Competitions Control Committee or to request a hearing, in accordance with Rules 6.4 (c), (d) and (f) T.O..
- (10) The County Competitions Control Committee, when adjudicating and reaching its determination on a transfer or permission to play application, shall give due consideration to the response of his current Club, and
- (a) be cognisant of the role played by his current Club in nurturing and developing the player;
- (b) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on his current Club; and
- (c) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on the promotion of the Association's aims in the County.
- (11) In accordance with Rules 6.4 (f) and 6.6 T.O., an appeal against a decision on a transfer may be made to the County Hearings Committee.
- (12) In accordance with Rule 6.4 (g) T.O., a transfer becomes effective:
- On the expiry of the period allowed for an Appeal against the decision on the Transfer application; or, if an Appeal is submitted, on the making of a decision on the Appeal; and
- On Codes (4.1) and (4.2) Code 4.2 being complied with.

5 GRADING OF CLUBS AND PLAYERS

- (1) All applications from Clubs and Players for re-grading must be sent in to the County Secretary by the 31st January and shall be dealt with in accordance with Codes (10.7) and (10.8).
- (2) Clubs shall be graded as Senior, Intermediate or Junior.
- (3) A team winning the Junior Football Championship shall be promoted to the Intermediate Grade for the following year.
- (4) A team winning the Intermediate Football Championship shall be promoted to the Senior Grade for the following year.
- (5) One team shall be relegated from the Senior Football Championship to the Intermediate Football Championship each year.
- (6) One team shall be relegated from the Intermediate Football Championship to the Junior Football Championship each year.

6 PLAYING RESTRICTIONS (CLUB)

(1) A player that is a member of a GAA Club that exclusively plays football may be given permission

to play hurling with another GAA Club within the county, provided that a fully completed approval form is signed by the player and the Secretary of both Clubs. That approval form is processed by the County Competitions Control Committee for decision. In the event of a Club Secretary not signing the approval form, the Competitions Control Committee shall still consider the application. Bye-Law 4 (2) (a) – (c) shall apply where appropriate. The County Management Committee shall designate hurling zones within the county and members of clubs that exclusively play football shall only be permitted to play hurling for another GAA club within that same zone, except under exceptional circumstances. **Penalty:** As set out in Code (8.3) i.

- (2) A player that is a member of a GAA Club that exclusively plays hurling may be given permission to play football with another GAA Club in the county, provided that a fully completed approval form is signed by the player and the Secretary of both Clubs. That approval form is processed by the County Competitions Control Committee for decision. In the event of a Club Secretary not signing the approval form, the Competitions Control Committee shall still consider the application. Bye-Law 4 (2) (a) (c) shall apply where appropriate. The County Management Committee shall designate zones within the county and members of clubs that exclusively play hurling shall only be permitted to play football for another GAA club within that same zone, except under exceptional circumstances. **Penalty:** As set out in Code (8.3) i.
- (3) Permissions to Play are only applicable until 31st December each year.
- (4) A permission to play request is primarily a matter between a player and the County Committee. When a player signs a permission to play request, his current Club has no right to delay or refuse permission for this request. If the Club has a valid reason as to why a player may not be granted a permission to play, its duty is to state such reason, quoting the applicable rules, to the County Secretary who will relay this information to the County Competitions Control Committee.

7 GENERAL

- (1) The above Byelaws shall supersede all previous Byelaws and relevant motions passed at County Convention. They shall be referred to by number in all objections, appeals and such like documents wherein they are used.
- (2) Amendments and/or additions to these Bye-Laws may be made at any Annual County Convention, or at a Special County Convention convened for the purpose, providing that the resolution proposing same is carried by a vote of three-fifths of the delegates present, entitled to vote and voting thereon. Motions for their amendment or deletion shall quote the number of the Bye-Law to be amended or deleted
- (3) A new Bye-Law may be enacted, at any Annual County Convention or Special County Convention, convened for this purpose, by a simple majority.
- (4) In accordance with Rule 3.15 T.O., new or amended bye-laws, as proposed, shall not become operative until sanctioned by the Management Committee of Central Council.

Motion 1

Proposed Amendment to Bye-Law 4. Playing Eligibility/Transfers

As the Gaelic Athletic Association is community centered, based on the allegiance of its members to their local Clubs and Counties, the Transfer and Declaration Rules in the Official Guide and in these Bye-Laws reflect that ethos. A player is considered to owe allegiance and loyalty to his First Club, as defined in Rule 6.3 T.O. 2023 and in these Bye-Laws.

Attachment to First Club

(1) A person, with a permanent residence within the County Boundary of Fermanagh, seeking to become a member of the Association shall have an unfettered choice of clubs to join.

Transfers Within County

- (2) Official Transfer Forms, which provide for the signature of the Transferee and the Secretary of the club to which the member wishes to join, shall be used for all transfer applications within the county.
- (3) No transfer shall be granted unless it is properly before the meeting.
- (4) Any player wishing to transfer from one Club to another within the County, shall make application between 09:00 on January 1st and 23:59 on March 31st (inclusive). Exception to (4): A player who has not played with a club for 96 weeks may apply for a transfer at any time during a year, provided the application for transfer is in order and complies with (2) (3) above.
- (5) All applications for transfer are to be submitted to the County Secretary. The County Secretary shall pass all applications received to the Competitions Control Committee, which shall notify clubs from which transfers are sought.
- (6) In accordance with Rule 6.4 (c), (e), T.O. 2023, the Competitions Control Committee shall process and decide on all applications for transfer within the jurisdiction of Coiste Contae Fhear Manach.
- (7) A transfer request is primarily a matter between a player and the County Committee. When a player signs a transfer request form, his current Club has no right to delay or refuse permission for this request. If the Club has a valid reason as to why a player may not be granted a transfer, its duty is to state such reason, quoting the applicable rules, to the County Secretary, who will relay this information to the County Competitions Control Committee or to request a hearing, in accordance with Rules 6.4 (c), (d) and (f) T.O. 2023.

- (8) The County Competitions Control Committee, when adjudicating and reaching its determination on a transfer or permission to play application, shall give due consideration to the response of his current Club, and
- (a) be cognisant of the role played by his current Club in nurturing and developing the player;
- (b) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on his current Club; and
- (c) consider the potential impact of the transfer of the player on the promotion of the Association's aims in the County.

Sub Committees:

In this evening's convention booklet, each subcommittee has provided a report on their activities during the year, I ask each one of you here to read the reports and highlight to your club the outstanding work that is been carried out at all levels within the county. I want to put on record my sincere thanks to each committee and thank the Chairpersons and Secretaries for their leadership. In total 200 members served on the various sub committees during the year a true reflection on the dedication to the association within the county.

Bord na n-Óg:

I want to thank Bord na n-Óg Contae Fhear Manach for their outstanding work during the year in organising all our youth activities in both football and hurling codes with 465 competitive games taking place from U12 to U18 in both codes with a similar number of Go Games. Such an undertaking is no mean feat given the complexities involved in arranging activities and in some cases rearranging fixtures at very short notice

We are indeed lucky in Fermanagh to have such a dedicated team of volunteers looking after youth affairs at both county level and within our clubs. The amount of time and effort that the Bord na n-Óg committee have devoted this year to the implementation of the tasks associated with the smooth running of youth competitions in the county is to be applauded. Thanks to all the clubs in the county who have actively supported our games at youth level. Thanks also to all our coaching staff who continue to provide meaning coaching programs for both hurling and football within our schools. The committee continued to support clubs in the promotion of health and wellbeing in our players, members and wider community. 13 clubs in Fermanagh are continuing their journey as part of the healthy club project aiming for either foundation, silver or Gold awards and congratulations to; Belcoo O'Rahilly and Tempo Maguires for joining in Phase 7. We would encourage all clubs to consider becoming part of the healthy club project.

I thank you all for your support for our nominated charity "Friends of The Cancer Centre" a local charity enhancing care and support for thousands of people affected by cancer across the county.

The Hurling Development committee:

On behalf of everyone I would like to thank Roisin Smyth for taking on the role of secretary of the hurling development committee a role which she carried out with great diligence and knowledge. One of the key points in Roisin's report is the need for all clubs to adhere to the decision to allocate Monday nights to hurling activities unfortunately several clubs did not adhere to this during the year. In Roisin's words "In order to grow the code we all need to promote hurling in the county and give all players the opportunity to play hurling"

I thank all our referees and the referee administration committee for the vital role they play in the provision of our fixtures. I encourage more young men and ladies to come forward and take up referring. I appeal to players, management, and supporters to respect all our match officials as they carry out their duties. Congratulations to all the Fermanagh referees who officiated at both National and Provincial level during the year.

Teams:

Congratulations to all clubs from U12 up to senior level that won trophies this year. Well done to the clubs that went on to represent the county at Provincial level, Lisbellaw in the UIHC, Erne Gaels in the UJHC, Erne Gaels in the UCSFC, Lisnaskea Emmetts in the UCIFC and Aghadrumsee St Macartan's in the UCJFC.

Scor Irish Language:

Thanks to all clubs in the county who continue to support Scor and Scor na nOg. The level of competition continues to increase year on year thanks to the efforts of Ciaran Maguire and his committee. I would ask all clubs to actively promote Scor and hopefully in the not-too-distant future all clubs in Fermanagh will be participating in Scor.

Without doubt the talent exists within every club. Congratulations to all clubs who have received Glor Na nGael/GAA awards for the promotion of the Irish Language within their clubs. Good luck to the Enniskillen Gael's Scor na nOg Nuachleas team who go on to represent Fermanagh in the All-Ireland Final at the end of January.

Finally, much credit must go to the wonderful singers on the Fear Manach panel of Amhrán na bhFiann performers. It was noticeable at the majority of championship games that our national anthem was sung by club members. We look forward to extending this further in 2025.

Safeguarding:

Anita our County Children's officer has outlined in her report where we are in relation to safeguarding in the county, she also outlines that 2025 will be a year to build on the foundations set in place over the past few years. Remember safeguarding is the responsibility of all of us and the wellbeing of our young players must be the number one priority. To quote from Leanne's report "Fermanagh GAA are very lucky to have someone of Anita's Calibre in this role" Than you Anita.

Safety and Facilities:

The chairperson of the Safety and Facilities Committee Sean has provided us with a detailed report on Lissan, New LED Floodlights, Gym, Wind Turbine, St Michael's Partnership, Brewster Park development, Ulster Council Grants, Club Loans and the New Development at Ashwood's Rd, Enniskillen. This committee works tirelessly in the background to ensure that our facilities are fit for purpose and are continually upgraded to order to meet the needs of all our teams both at club and county level. Thank you.

Clubs throughout the county have either completed, are in the process of, or are about to start major developments, I congratulate all involved on their foresight and ambition. At the end of the day, it will be the younger generation who will benefit.

PR and Marketing:

Thanks to our PRO Deirdre for all your hard work with the promotion of Fermanagh GAA activities within the media and on all the social media channels. The production of programmes for our National league and the club championship is not an easy task but it was completed with outstanding efficiency. One point I have noted in Deirdre's report is the increase of abusive comments online and face to face directed at many of our volunteers this is totally unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Clubs are responsible for the actions of their members and should do all within their power to discourage such behaviour.

Thanks to our Fermanagh GAA TV production team under the guidance of Phil, our games are now streamed worldwide and provide a link with Fermanagh people living in many parts of the world.

Media:

To the Fermanagh Herald and the Impartial Reporter, I say thank you for your coverage and promotion of our games in the county.

Coaching:

To our coaching staff under the direction of Teresa McNabb Fermanagh Games Development Manager, thank you for all your hard work and dedication throughout the year. The Coaching & Games Report contained in tonight's convention booklet outlines in detail the extraordinary amount of activity that was untaken by our coaches this year. It is important that all clubs are made fully aware of both the amount of work undertaken by our county coaches and the assistance that they can provide to clubs.

As I have previously stated several roles within the coaching structures have still to be filled but we will be doing our utmost to alleviate this situation within the early part of 2025.

Catchment Areas:

Following a deliberation by the Hearings Committee the need for regularization of our regulations over whether we had definitions of our Club catchment areas was apparent. I set up the Club Catchment Area Workgroup to make proposals to be brought forward for adoption by County Committee. A scoping exercise was undertaken nationally to find out how other Counties deal with this and our Clubs were asked for their proposals as to what they felt was the best way forward. A very wide range of views were returned, and discussions were held with numerous Clubs. Following this it was decided to ask Clubs for their considered opinion as to whether catchment areas were necessary or not. Following the overwhelming view of this vote that they were not necessary it was decided to bring a motion to County Convention, that motion is to be brought to the floor for discussion and decision tonight. Thanks to Tiernach and all the members of the working group who worked diligently to come up with possible solutions.

Strategic Plan:

2024 was the final year of our current Strategic Plan (Ar aghaidh agus os a chionn Fear Manach). It is important that we look now at the way ahead for Fermanagh GAA in our ever-changing society and link our plan with that of the national GAA Plan (Aontas 2026) and the new Ulster GAA Plan. This will be one of the key priorities for 2025.

Schools:

Our schools both primary and secondary are the lifeblood of the association within the county. I thank all the staff within our schools who give tirelessly of their time in the development of the skills of our games. I ask all clubs to continue to support the schools in whatever way possible be it coaching or equipment. It is vital that there is a clear and tangible link between clubs and schools.

Integration:

At National level, integration between the association, camogie and ladies' football was prioritised, this has proved to be a slow process however the sooner it becomes a reality the better. We look forward to working more closely with the LGFA especially around the whole area of fixtures and venues. On that point I would like to congratulate the Fermanagh ladies' team and management on winning the 2024 All Ireland Junior title, a great achievement. Well done.

Conclusion:

Finally to my fellow officers I say thank you for all you help and support during the year, a special word of thanks to our vice chairperson John who stood in for me on numerous occasions when I was unavailable, I hope it gives him a taste of what lies ahead for him, to our extremely dedicated County Rúnaí Tom Boyle who kept me on the straight and narrow during the year, to our very hard-working and efficient County Treasurer Sean Burns, thanks also to rúnaí cúnta Phil Flanagan for his wise advice on all matters related to the official guide, there were times when I thought he slept with it under his pillow and finally to our PRO for being the shield between me and the media.

At this evening's convention we have several officers who have completed their term of office, I thank each and every one of them for their hard work and commitment over the last five years and I wish them well in whatever role they undertake in the future. I know none of them will be lost to the association.

I want to extend to all who have suffered the loss of a loved one in the last twelve months our deepest condolences.

APPENDIX 2 - CLUB ÉIRNE REPORT 2024

From The Chair...

After the frantic nature of 2023 and the Win a House Competition matters in Club Eirne were quieter in 2024. This pause in intense work coincided with the County officers carrying out the necessary due diligence regarding the purchase of land that we have heard about tonight.

The planned purchase of 25 acres of land at Ashwoods is a very significant moment in the proud history of Fermanagh GAA. This along with the imminent publication of the Review of Coaching in our County which has been ongoing throughout the latter months of 2024 now points the way forward for the County for many years to come.

On behalf of all involved in Club Eirne I congratulate those involved in the land purchase and indeed in the Coaching Review work. We welcome the fact that we now have a clear vision for Fermanagh GAA. We know we are going to take forward very significant capital developments and deliver training facilities that are on a par with any county across the island.

We also know we will shortly have a suite of recommendations in relation to how coaching should be taken forward in the County so with those key strategies in place the vision for the future is clear and that will no doubt be welcomed by all Fermanagh Gaels.

We do however recognise that to deliver on such a vision will take patience and a hell of a lot of money. We wish the County Management committee success in their forthcoming discussions with various grant aiding organisations, Croke Park and our local Council.

Funding such a development and a new coaching model certainly aligns itself with many central and local government policies and to those of our Association.

We also recognise that help will only come our way if we provide evidence that we are prepared to help ourselves and that is where Club Eirne and the Gaels of Fermanagh must step up and play their part in helping to raise match funding for such ambitious but much needed developments.

Club Eirne believe that if we can get our Coaching structures right in our Clubs and at County level and we have the facilities in place to allow our young people to prosper in their chosen sport then we can all hold our heads high, satisfied in the knowledge that we have done everything in our gift to ensure the youth of our county have been provided with the opportunity to 'Be the Best that they can Be'.

While 2024 was more low key for Club Eirne than the previous nine that I have been Chair we are still very proud of the fact that our work generated £138,651 for Fermanagh GAA.

This again is down to our loyal members, patrons, gold patrons and Brand Partners recognising the need to support Fermanagh GAA and putting their hands in their pockets to do so. For that we thank them sincerely.

So, as we approach a New Year, it is time to reinvigorate and relaunch Club Eirne and get back to recruiting new members and patrons as it is their consistent funds that will be the 'lifeblood' of Fermanagh GAA for many years to come.

We need to raise a minimum of £300k per annum for the next 10 years to help fund the new developments at Ashwoods, support the implementation of the agreed recommendations that emanate from the Coaching Review as well as provide funds to help support the day to day running costs of our teams and our current facilities.

APPENDIX 2 - CLUB ÉIRNE REPORT 2024

That is a significant challenge, and it is one everyone reading this report must consider. If you want the best for the future generations of boys and girls in our County, you must consider how you can help Club Eirne achieve this financial target.

For several years I have very much respected the opinion that a minimum contribution of £500 per annum is above the contribution level of many people in our County so with that in mind we have developed a Club Eirne Fermanagh GAA Lotto with the first draw to be held this weekend.

Contributions from £1 upwards will secure contributors an entry each week to winning an amazing jackpot of £25k – yes £25k on offer every week plus weekly consolation prizes if the jackpot is not won. I believe the Gaels of Fermanagh will row in behind this initiative as it will be a major part of how we go about achieving our target of raising £300k per annum.

Further to this I have been speaking to quite a few people over the last 12 months and have enlisted several new faces to help us to recruit new members and patrons in the years ahead, so this is a positive start, and I welcome them to the Club Eirne committee.

As ever in my end of year comments I wish to set our plans for the year ahead. These are as follows:

- Relaunch Club Eirne in late 2024 / early 2025.
- Recruit 100 new members, patrons, gold patrons in 2025 and endeavour to record an income of over £200k
- Record a minimum income of £100k from the Club Eirne Fermanagh GAA lotto.
- · Seek out further Brand Partners.
- Contact those people who have for one reason, or another dropped off making payment to Club Eirne over the past 24 months.
- · Investigate the possibility of hosting a

business breakfast event.

With these targets in mind 2025 will be a busy year and your continued support and generosity will be crucial in helping us achieve our goals. I would once again assure you that your hard-earned contributions are being spent wisely and prudently for the advancement of Fermanagh GAA and to ensure that we can pass on a thriving organisation to the next generation of Fermanagh Gaels.

My heartfelt thanks and best wishes are extended to all our Members, Patrons, Gold Patrons and Brand Partners who supported our efforts throughout the year and also many thanks to the members of the Club Eirne Committee.

Finally, thanks to Gerard O Brien and Co, Accountants who audit our financial accounts so efficiently.

Wishing everyone a safe and peaceful Christmas and best wishes to all Fermanagh Gaels in 2025.

Senior Football



This result placed them in the Ulster Semi Final against Down Champions Kilcoo with Kilcoo winning on a scoreline of Kilcoo 4-12, Erne Gaels 1.10.





RESPONSIBILITIES

In accordance with Riail 3.20 (ii) An Treoir Oifigiúil and Riail 3.2 Coiste Chontae Fhear Manach Fo-Dhlithe, An Coiste Cheannais na gComórtaisí Fhear Manach shall:

- Be responsible for all arrangements, including the appointment of Referees, for and control
 of any matters arising from Games under the jurisdiction of the County Committee, including
 disciplinary matters other than those functions reserved to the County Hearings Committee.
- Process and make recommendations to the County Committee on the Grading of Clubs.
- Investigate and process matters relating to the Enforcement of Rules, including hearing Objections and Counter-Objections.
- Be responsible, in the first instance, for making decisions on applications for Transfer Within the County and the Grading of Players.
- Consist of a minimum of five members, who shall be appointed from members of the County Committee and/or other suitable personnel, together with the County Referees' Administrator who shall be entitled to vote only on the appointment of referees.
- Have plenary powers.

Introduction

2025 saw a much increased workload for the main officers on the Competitions Control Committee. In addition to the existing extensive duties of adult competitions and disciplinary matters, we found ourselves being unexpectedly handed responsibility for the day-to-day management of underage football and hurling in the month on the 9th March. Therefore, this report will cover all aspects of club competitions within the county, both adult and underage.

The increased workload was not easy to manage, but we think it went smoothly enough. Clubs were given their entire football fixtures for the underage football season on the 12th and 13th March, a significant improvement on operations in recent years. However, in order to reduce the administration burden on the CCC, all communications regarding fixture changes were required to come through the Club Secretary as there were some clubs who had up to five people making contact and it was impossible to stay on top of things in that fashion.

Playing Rules of Gaelic Football

2025 will be remembered as the year when radical changes were made to the playing rules of Gaelic Football. Looking back, changes such as the kickout/advanced marks, the introduction of the black card and stopping players passing the ball back to the goalkeeper directly after a kickout now appear quite modest changes, despite the controversy at the time of their own passing.

The introduction of a whole new raft of playing rules presented a significant challenge to all of us involved with Gaelic Games, for players, for spectators, for team officials and for referees. But also spare a thought for committees in charge of competitions. There was a lot for all of us to grapple with, but in the whole, after one year, the changes have had a positive effect on the game as a spectacle.

The new rules have added a significant increase to the workload of referees already under immense to pressure to make a split second decision, when the viewing public has the benefit of replays to aid them.

Senior Football League Division 1 Final

In Fermanagh, we had an early example of the scale of the challenge involved and there were similar issues to arise in other counties. The outcome of the Senior Football League Final was brought into question by the incorrect awarding of scores to Derrygonnelly Harps. Two points were kicked from inside the 40m arc that were incorrectly awarded as two point scores, leaving the scoreboard showing a two point win for Derrygonnelly Harps. However footage from Fermanagh GAA TV clearly showed that both scores were inside the 40m arc and should not have counted as two point scores.

In the immediate aftermath, Derrygonnelly Harps were presented with the league trophy and no doubt they enjoyed the celebrations that followed. In the days following the final, Erne Gaels submitted an Objection to the awarding of the game to Derrygonnelly Harps, who were given a right to Counter-Object. In their response, Derrygonnelly recognised the impact the online commentary had on the welfare of the match officials involved, acknowledged that there were 'two errors at the later stages of the game' and suggested that extra time would have been the most likely outcome had these errors not materialised. They further stated their willingness to abide by the decision of the CCC.

Based on this amicable response, the Competitions Control Committee (in the absence of the Chairperson) took the decision to order a replay of the Senior Football League Division 1 Final, committing to working with both clubs to find a suitable date. The committee was conscious of the

difficulty there would be in finding a suitable date with the Senior Football Championship about to get underway, as well as past lessons in this regard - the league final was unplayed in 2018 as a result of a degree of inflexibility from the two participating clubs and a lack of ruthlessness from the Competitions Control Committee at the time.

Returning to 2025, it is clear that, despite the decision taken in Fermanagh, Rule 7.5 (n) relating to Objections in this manner is narrowly defined to only account for accounting errors by match officials rather than the wrong type of score being awarded.

Similar Objections submitted by clubs in other counites were either deemed to be out of order by the CCC in their county (or by the Provincial Hearings Committee on appeal) and these disputes included queries over where a score was kicked from and whether or not the ball was touched by another player before going over the crossbar.

Ahead of the Senior Football Championship Final involving the two same clubs as the League Final, approaches were made to both clubs to play a single match for both trophies but there was no agreement to be reached.

With the passage of time and the progress of Erne Gaels in the Ulster Club Championship, we find it increasingly unlikely that the League Final will be played and that despite the inherent unfairness surrounding the outcome, we feel we have no alternative other than to follow the rules and have made the decision to award the 2025 Senior Football League Division 1 Final to Derrygonnelly Harps. Erne Gaels have submitted an appeal to this decision and a Hearing has been scheduled by the Provincial Hearings Committee to determine the outcome of the matter.

Senior Football League Structure

At the beginning of the year, a decision was taken to rearrange the Senior Football League structures to a 3 Division model, with 8 teams in Division 1 in 2026, and 6 teams in both Division 2 and Division 3.

The CCC met recently and we believe there is merit in considering tweaks to this proposed structure as any league Division with 6 teams will likely become very stale very quickly. Consider two teams in the Intermediate Championship and operating in either Division 2 or Division 3 in 2026 as an example. They will likely play each other 3 times in the new league, possibly meet in the League Final and could also meet each other another twice in the 2026 Intermediate Championship.

Therefore, each of those teams will likely play 15/16 games in the league and 4-6 in the Intermediate Championship depending on their progress. But 5/6 of those games will likely be against the same opponent. The same story is of course true for the 4 teams competing in the Junior Football Championship. We are concerned that the impact of this change is that teams will end up repeatedly playing against a small group of teams.

We would like to explore options for making amendments to the 2026 league structure that would not undermine the spirit of the intention to introduce a 3 division structure. We think there is an option to bring the Senior Football League and Erne Cup competitions together and organise these competitions across 5 Divisions of 8 teams. We would suggest that the games in Divisions 1 and 2 could be played on a Friday night, with most of the games in Divisions 3-5 being played on Saturdays and Sundays, similar to the existing structure.

There would likely be some fixture scheduling problems with such an arrangement in that there is an overlap of clubs that would be operating in a new Division 3 and Division 5 but solutions would have to be found to this. Additionally, a Reserve team could realistically win promotion from Division 3 to Division 2, adding further complexities to the scheduling arrangements.

We think this option is something that deserves consideration, but not something to be either rushed into or ruled out altogether and is a decision for the incoming County Committee to consider in the New Year, but a discussion is encouraged within clubs in the meantime.

If such a system were to be put in place, then additional issues would also need careful consideration, including the reliability of First 11/13 lists, the retention/scheduling of a Reserve championship, whether second teams from a club could be promoted to Division 2 if they won Division 3, and the possible inclusion of some Reserve teams in the Junior Football Championship.

In 2025, we continued with the same championship structure for the Senior, Intermediate and Junior Football Championship and the results have been provided earlier in this report.

Provision of Referees

We continue to have a serious under provision of referees for club games. In the early part of 2025, with a considerable number of referees involved in inter-county activity across both football and hurling, there were only 13 referees available for several weekends in a row. On these weekends, games were taking place in the Senior Football League (10 games), Erne Cup (9 games), and U14 Football League (9 games).

On a fortnightly basis, there were also 13 games to be played in the U12 football league, but there just wasn't the number of referees available to cover all these games and as a result the U12 games were

played using the Go Games model. This caused quite a bit of controversy and discussion and it was clearly explained that the primary reason for this was a shortage of referees and additional referees needed to be provided by clubs to change this approach. Unfortunately, only two clubs, Ederney St Joseph's and Maguiresbridge St Mary's secured an additional referee this year. Good progress, but not enough to deal with the immediate crisis at hand.

In 2025, there were only 26 football referees in total on the pool available for appointment to cover all 300 underage games and 291 adult games.

Each club is reminded that they need to be providing at least two football referees in order to ensure that we can get our games played. Each club involved in hurling also needs to provided a referee to look after hurling games as the situation is just as bad when it comes to trying to get underage hurling games played. Most weeks, we only had two hurling referees available to cover games.

We would therefore encourage clubs to identify potential referees urgently and get them lined up for training over the winter months. We accept that this isn't an easy role to identify people for. We could possibly get by without a few coaches or ticket sellers in our clubs, but as an Association, we simply couldn't continue to operate without referees.

Discipline

Despite the introduction of the new playing rules and considerable changes to dealing with dissent, disruptive conduct and other unacceptable behaviour, too many people are still engaged in disgraceful conduct towards our match officials. These people are not all team officials and players. Adults looking after underage teams and club officers have a responsibility to deal with the conduct of their club members. It cannot all be left to the referee or the CCC to challenge unacceptable behaviour from club members or spectators, regardless of who they are. If you see a spectator shouting abuse at a referee from within your club, then there is a responsibility on your club to deal with it.

What kind of message does it send out to young players if they see adults shouting vile abuse at match officials and nothing being done about it? Children take their lead from adults, and clubs should be ensuring that they are only allowing responsible and sensible adults to be involved with teams.

This not only means following the minimum requirements set out by the Code of Behaviour and outlined by the County Children's Officer in her report, but also making sure that absolute lunatics are not left in positions of responsibility looking after groups of young children. You wouldn't want your own children being influenced in such a way so why would it be acceptable to inflict it on other children? We must set higher standards for ourselves and for those involved in our association and that means challenging bad behaviour, from both children and from adults.

There is provision within the Official Guide for Disruptive Conduct by Players, Team Officials or Supporters to be dealt with and this rule has been utilised on more than one occasion by the CCC in 2025 to clamp down on such behaviour.

A word to referees that if they expect unacceptable behaviour towards them to be dealt with, then the alleged infraction needs to be included on their match report. All too often, the same individuals within the County repeatedly breach the Rules and then a blind eye is turned to it. All that is doing is encouraging that same individual to carry out the same conduct week after week.

Referees are also encouraged to make appropriate use of the new 50m penalty for dissent and disruptive conduct in order to clamp down on this behaviour. After being penalised once or twice in a game, people will soon learn to have manners, and if they don't then it is their own fault and those involved with their team won't be long letting them know to have manners.

Clubs are also reminded that there is provision in Article 5.11 of their Club Constitution to discipline their members who breach rules of the Association.

A new Rule was also added at Congress 2025 as follows: "No Member of the Association may communicate with a Match Official with a view to influencing the contents of a Referee's Match Report. Unauthorised communication in breach of this Rule shall be considered as misconduct discrediting the Association." Clubs are encouraged to make sure that their players, team officials and Executive members are aware of this addition as the problem has been an ever increasing one in recent years.

Reserve Football Competitions

This year saw the retention of the Erne Cups in three divisions, with the Reserve Football Championships moving back a two tiered structure. Two clubs struggled with their Reserve teams this year and comprise nearly 50% (17/36) of the games conceded. A flippant regard to the Erne Cup seems to be remaining within the County, with all 3 games in the last Rounds of Divisions 1 and 2 conceded, and 1 out of the 3 in Division 3 being conceded.

The two tiered Championship certainly appears to have been more of a success, although there are questions to be asked about the benefits of moving to First 11 lists for Reserve Football.

Following a motion from a club, a change was made to the Competition Regulations to reduce the number of players in a club ineligible to play in the Erne Cup from 13 down to 11. We are not convinced this move had the desired effect. The reduction to 11 has increased the crossover between Senior football and Reserve football and in the round, is having a more negative than positive effect.

It is increasingly difficult to retain young players making the transition from underage to adult football and we do not think the solution is to deny them more games by increasing the number of Senior players that can play Reserve football. We would suggest that for 2026, that we return to a First 13 and move to a First 15 for the Reserve Football Championships.

Far too many games are still being conceded and this attitude would likely prevail even if only 5 players had to be named. The issue is not simply a shortage of players, it seems to be the unwillingness of many players to travel to play a game.

An alarming statistic - of the 19 games that were conceded in the Erne Cup (not including the 17 others that were conceded by Maguiresbridge St Mary's and Belcoo O'Rahilly's), 15 of those were conceded by the away team. Clubs are asked to reflect on this reality and to address it.

Adult Hurling

2025 saw an increase in the number of teams participating at adult hurling, with Lisbellaw St Patrick's Senior team representing the county with distinction in the Ulster Club Championship at Intermediate Level. With a shortage of competitive activity in Fermanagh for their players, Lisbellaw St Patrick's participated in both the Armagh Hurling League Division 1 and the Tyrone Senior Hurling League. Remarkably, they won both competitions with 7 wins from 8 in Armagh and 4 from 4 in Tyrone.

Clubs from Fermanagh also participated in a cross-county competition in the Cú Chulainn League, with Erne Gaels reaching the Division 3 Cup Final and the Reserve team from Lisbellaw St Patrick's winning the Division 3 Shield Final. It may have been deemed to be a cross-county competition, but in reality, the four Fermanagh teams were in a group of their own and with the exception of finals, didn't play against any teams from outside the county.

Those four teams also entered the Reserve Hurling Cup but the number of games actually played calls the viability of the competition into question. Lisbellaw's Reserve team and Erne Gaels reached the final without actually playing a game due to the games being conceded. Belnaleck Art McMurroughs and Knocks Grattans did manage to play against each other in a one-sided affair.

Underage Competitions

The 2025 season in Fermanagh marked a notable change in the organisation of our underage Gaelic Football and Hurling programmes. Traditionally, U12 and U14 football competitions were run independently, each within its own shoty defined period.

In 2025, to enhance player development opportunities and to extend the competitive calendar, the county adopted an alternating weekly format - U12 fixtures one week, followed by U14 fixtures the next. From U12 to U18 in football, there was a growth of 30% in the number of games scheduled all with the intention of extending the playing season to improve the standard of football within the county.

This was coupled with a much extended Go Games football programme at U8.5 (P4) and U10.5 (P6). 14 dates were offered for each ages in 2025, a jump from 10 at U10.5 and 6 at U8.5 in 2024.

Due to the Youth Committee not functioning this year, Stephen McElrone (Coaching Officer) was given responsibility for organising Go Games activity at U8.5 and U10.5. These age grades were a huge success, with feedback from members very positive on the increased games provision, better communication and much more notice on the scheduling of games.

The CCC organised its competitions based on recommendations provided by the Gradings Committee. Our thanks to that group for the work they put into trying to figure out how best to divide clubs based on ability. This isn't an easy job, especially at U14 level where the competitiveness of the initial groups was hard to guage with no previous competition to use as a baseline.

Using a previous U11.5 tournament is not accurate and nor will using U12 activity, competitive or otherwise, as the size of the pitch is different, the number of players on the team is different, and there are a whole host of other variable factors that change from U12 to U14. Clubs dealt with this year's U12 Go Games in different ways, with some clubs using it as an opportunity to maximise participation and others adopting a more competitive approach. Some clubs have used a mixture of this depending on their opponents on the day or other factors.

There is nothing wrong with any of these approaches, but the variation on offer does mean that the results cannot be accurately used to rank or grade teams for future competitions. Using a series of results from U12 games this year to determine gradings in two years will not work, anymore than using that data to decide the teams judged by some parties to be deserving of a place in a final based on the results of the Go Games.

After the first round of U14 fixtures given the scale of difference in many of the divisions, we regraded the teams based on accurate data and this transformed the competition. After the first round of fixtures played, two thirds of all games had a gap of 10 or more points between the teams, which was not developing players on either team. It was clear to most people that something had to be done.

The introduction of a 7 a side competition at U16 level was popular and offered additional football at a time when a full competition could not be arranged due to the ongoing activity with schools and County Minors in the first half of the year. This is something we plan to expand on for 2026 across additional age groups where the calendar allows and with venue availability.

As always, it is very challenging to manage a sufficient calendar of games activity with every increasing pressures at both ends of the year with weather, and particularly with the expansion of inter-county activity at U17 level in both football and hurling.

Our Minor Footballers exited the All Ireland Minor Tier 3 Championship on 11th May 2025. Our Minor Hurlers entered the Celtic Challenge once again this year and reached the Corn Michael Feery Final, which was played on 7th June 2025. Given the number of players involved in both panels, clubs are unwilling to participate in competitive activity during this window, with some people also complaining about GCSE and A-Level study leave/exams occurring at this time.

There appears to consideration given at a national level to change the inter-county minor football structure to mirror that of the Celtic Challenge in hurling, to provide additional tiers and more competitive football for counties at the lower end of the scale. Whilst this could be a welcome move to provide more meaningful games for our players, in reality it will likely mean a longer inter-county season, reduce the window for underage club games and have players playing against a lower standard of opposition.

Our Minor Hurlers participated in the Celtic Challenge competition, which is for 38 teams from all 32 counties. The top 16 counties play separately in the Leinster and Munster Minor Championships and this competition is for less developed counties and additional teams from the strong counties. So in reality, we were competing in the 11th Division at U17 level in hurling. We have to ask is this the road we want to go down in football as well?

The CCC ran an online survey from the 12th - 28th November aimed at seeking views on underage competitions in 2025. We are only starting to assess the responses in detail but it is clear that there are key themes coming through, including an appreciation for the improved notice of fixtures in 2025, improved communication and better planning across both codes. There are mixed views on the changes to the underage football calendar, with some in favour of the longer season and others presenting reasons as to why they feel overlap doesn't suit them or their club.

Many have lamented the fact that U12 was played on a non-competitive basis in 2025 but this was down to the shortage of referees within the county. The only solution is for more individuals to take on this role. There is no point in a club with multiple U12 teams complaining about no referees for U12 games if they haven't provided a sufficient number from within their club to take on this task.

Competitive club hurling also saw some growth in the early stages of 2025 with an much expanded games programme planned, but tragic circumstances caused the widespread postponements of

games over a prolonged period. There is still a strong sense of loss felt by those who knew Vanessa Whyte and her two children James and Sara Rutledge. The manner of their brutal killing sent shockwaves through the GAA and the wider community and for a time, the playing of our games slipped down the priority list. But we can be sure that they would not want it to remain there. Vanessa was a tireless worker in her adopted club of Lisbellaw St Patrick's and a driving force to make things happen. She was a passionate advocate for the plight of the hurlers in the county and never hesitated to report back her feelings on how things were being done but more importantly how she felt they could be improved. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a n-anamacha dílse.

The shortage of people involved as voluntary hurling coaches in clubs is continuing to restrict the ability to grow the game, with poor use being made of the 18 blitz dates offered across U8.5 and U10.5 for hurling. The dates offered in 2024 were on Saturdays not allocated for football, but those slots were not utilised so they were freed up for football in 2025 and the hurling dates moved to Monday evenings, with a similar outcome.

For various reasons, it has not been possible to conclude some underage hurling competitions. At minor level, the late addition of a team from Knocks Grattans has caused further disruption to a competition already deferred from its original window during the summer as a result of the tragic circumstances outlined above. It was already difficult to secure a suitable date to play Minor games with U16 football already scheduled for Saturday mornings and the challenge presented for dual players with the progression of the St Patrick's Donagh football in the Junior Football Championship and the Ulster Club Championship ruling out weekends for them.

This all outlines the challenges involved with scheduling games and deviating from the programme outlined in the early part of the year, which is done in consideration of all Gaelic Games activity in the county to avoid situations like this arising, unless in exceptional circumstances as happened with the U14 hurling competitions this year.

He was an ever present at meetings and matches, always entertaining those around him and a consistent support for those in positions of leadership in the Association and is sadly missed. Brian Armitage & Tom Boyle

This County Convention marks the end of an era in Fermanagh GAA with Brian Armitage stepping down from his role as Cathaoirleach after four years, with Tom Boyle soon to retire from his position as Rúnaí. Both Brian and Tom have been very supportive of the Competitions Control Committee during their lengthy periods in leadership positions within Fermanagh GAA. Brian also served as our Committee Secretary during two challenging years of Covid from December 2019 to December 2021.

Despite County Bye-Laws precluding them from participating in the affairs of the CCC, they have

both been extremely helpful and supportive to the committee. More tributes will rightly be paid to both Brian and Tom in due course, but for now, a word of thanks to two sound GAA volunteers for their help over the course of the last 12 months.

- Physically/verbally assaulting a referee.

- Engaging in disruptive conduct on the line.
- Dangerous play.
- Misconduct considered to have discredited the Association.
- Contributing to a match having to be ended before full-time.
- Number of Fermanagh Hearings upheld: x9
- Number of Fermanagh Hearings overturned: x3

Summary

- (i) The successful completion of Gaelic Games within Co. Fermanagh is largely due to the diligence and commitment of our referee body. We as an Association cannot emphasise enough our gratitude to them for this work.
- (ii) Referees need to be more succent, short and specific within their reports than being over descriptive.

We would recommend for the County Referee's Officer to advise the referees WHEN DETAILING AN INCIDENT to start their report with the following words: 'I clearly saw/heard'

- (iii) Within our county we have had ONE club appealing EVERYTHING! This clearly reflects on their being a poor executive leadership guiding this club.
- (iv) Another club; albeit very successful within modern times, really need to evaluate themselves on what they are about and how they go about their business for e.g. manipulation of audio/visual evidence. Not only did this action lack of integrity but it was downright dishonourable on the club's behalf!

Rule 7.3 (aa) (4) A Member deliberately giving false evidence or otherwise misleading a Hearing, whether orally or in writing, on any matter of fact, shall be guilty of Misconduct Considered to have Discredited the Association.

The penalties for such can lead to suspension, expulsion from the Association and Disqualification.

A Fine, Deduction of Points in League Competitions may also be considered. Rule 7.2 (e)

- (v) Members of the Hearings only come from a small number of clubs. It doesn't look good for Fermanagh GAA when we have to bring outside members to adjudicate when clubs refuse to accept sitting members.
- (vi) Clubs must accept that appealing everything is not consistent with the rules of our Association and they can in future have penalties increased for trying to just have a Hearing.

A new Rule was added in Congress 2025 in relation to frivolous appeals.

Potential Increase in Penalty

Rule 7.3 (dd) - In the case of any infraction of Rule 7.2 (b) Category III and IV and Rule 7.2 (c) Category IIa and IIIa which is deemed Proven at a requested Hearing, the Hearings Committee, at its sole discretion, may determine that any one of the following positions be applied:

- (i) The Hearing had no prospect of success or
- (ii) The Hearing request was an abuse of process.

Penalty

An additional One Match Suspension

Or

An additional four-week Term of Suspension.

(vii) There is a certain type of etiquette that ALL clubs should be pertaining to aspire to whilst upholding the spirit of the CLG / GAA. Unfortunately, this is not the case with some of our clubs!

The 2025 season for the Fermanagh Bord na nÓg, was definitely a season like no other in my time, a season that would have to navigate the implementation of the new rules to our football game, as well as still navigating another year of the reversal of our age grades. The main body of work of the Bord na nÓg is the provision of a safe and nurturing environment for young people to learn our Gaelic games, develop their skills and reach their full potential within our county.

Our underage players in Fermanagh will spend some of the most enjoyable days of their lives playing our Gaelic games, socialising with their friends and making memories that will last a lifetime. They will do so during some of the most important developmental years of their lives. It is the responsibility of the Bord na nÓg to ensure that they enjoy all our Gaelic Games and can participate in them in a spirit of fair play, mutual respect, equality and most importantly, safely.

In the past five years as the Bord nan Óg chairman and eight years representing his club, Derrygonnelly Harps at the Youth Board, nobody has done more to uphold the mission, the vision and the values of the GAA than Eoghán Cassidy. He has always led from the front strongly, diligently and passionately. Never afraid to speak his mind, never hesitant to share his opinions or skepticisms. No challenge encountered was ever a problem that we couldn't resolve.

Eoghan carried out so many jobs in his role, most of which went unseen. His passion, heart and enthusiasm for Gaelic Games in Fermanagh and the direction they should be headed has never wavered. Eoghan's integrity and great leadership made him an excellent Chairperson. I am extremely grateful to Eoghan for his time, his patience, his dedication and his council through all the highs and lows we encountered together. It has been my honour and privilege to serve alongside Eoghán for the past five years. Leaving big boots to fill, Eoghan steps down from the Bord na nÓg for an equally important role within his club and we wish him all the very best in his new GAA venture. Go raibh mile maith agat agus árd mór ort Eoghan.

Our Fermanagh Youth Gradings Committee, tasked with considering several years' worth of underage performances, gradings, rankings, and results, consists of Eoghan Cassidy, Ciarán Carey, John Prunty, Thomas McElroy, Micheál McCaffrey, Sinead Casey and myself. We were delighted to welcome Barry Rice (Maguiresbridge) to the committee this season and were greatly appreciative of his knowledge and expertise. I thank you all for your commitment, experience, and expertise in what is always a complicated and arduous task.

Every member on that committee puts in an incredible amount of time studying these gradings,

scrutinising league tables and challenging placings, to ensure we produce a fair, accurate and competitive grading of teams for the upcoming season. Unfortunately this season, the collective knowledge and expertise of this committee wasn't always taken into consideration. We owe each of them a debt of gratitude for completing this very thankless task annually and hope for their continued council in the season ahead.

Only the second season since moving back to the even age grades and it was always going to be the most difficult year for grading, at an U14 level in particular where absolutely no data for gradings existed previously. Unfortunately, this will once again be the case for U14 grading in 2027, as a direct consequence of the U12 age grade games reverting back to a Go Games non-competitive format this year. However, through previous experience, it took three years for the odd age grades to settle in and we envisaged the ripple of problems changing back to evens to be no less complex and hope 2026 will see the grading process settle again for the most part.

As we say every season, gradings are not an exact science! We can only use the information at our disposal, we rely heavily on the honest input of clubs as to where their teams' abilities lie and are the first to admit that there may have been oversights made, we are only human after all! However, the more eyes studying this data, the more accurate our gradings can be, the more competitive our games will be and the greater the player development we can expect as a result. Anyone who has an interest in and wishes to join the gradings committee would be most welcome.

The turbulent pathway back to a seamless masterplan of even age grades continues to be a work in progress. The biggest issues facing us in the 2024 playing season were still waiting for us in 2025, club leagues at the same time as Academy Leagues of the same age grades, an ever narrowing games calendar, the minor players season overlapping with adult fixtures, clubs prioritising their players to fulfil football fixtures whilst hurling fixtures suffer the consequences.

Continuing with the status quo masterplan simply wasn't going to address any of the issues. CCC proposed a radical alternative masterplan, with many adjustments to most age grades. Change is never easy, universally accepted or perfect, but change is very often necessary.

The outcomes of the Football Review Committee were discussed at length by CCC. Where adoption of the new rules were deemed age appropriate for our players in Fermanagh, we updated the Rules and Regulations document accordingly. CCC then produced and published a document which incorporated the Rules and Regulations for both codes (football and hurling) along with the season's masterplan dates for both codes.

The most notable addition to the fixtures masterplan was the introduction of an U16 7-aside competition which commenced mid-March. This was a competition introduced to bridge the time gap from the last U16 fixture in 2024 until the start of the first U16 league fixture in 2025, which would now occur at the latter end of the season.

15 Fermanagh clubs, separated into 2 groups, participated in the 7-aside league which took place every Thursday in the Bawnacre and culminated in the top team in each group making the 7-aside finals with playoff fixtures for the teams finishing second and third. Whilst in it's infancy, it did offer some players in the county an opportunity to play small sided, short, sharp and fast paced fixtures.

The U12 and U14 fixtures also changed from the norm, alternating weekly from the 22nd March for 6

Months until September. The U14 gradings deficits were very apparent after the initial few games in each round and the decision was taken to play one round of fixtures in a group stage format (with a final at the end) and then use these rankings to divide the 3 groups into 4 divisions and proceed with a single round league (with a final at the end) before commencing the U14 Championship. This age grade in hindsight was probably the biggest success story of the season with an increased number of games provided, albeit not everyone was a fan of the extended playing season.

Unfortunately, the U12 season didn't build on the massive successes of 2024 and saw a reversal from a competitive league to a Go Games format. CCC highlighted a crisis point with the considerable drop-off in the number of active referees in the county across both football (GAA and LGFA) and hurling and the significant increase in the number of underage games being played.

An initial proposal was emailed to club secretary's, to create a pool of adult club members who were willing to officiate at U12 football and hurling games. Clubs were asked to nominate at least one person for each U12 team their club was entering, who was willing to act as a referee for U12 games and was not already an existing referee. Disappointingly, the three day turnaround for these names, only yielded a response from one single club in the county, sealing the fate for the U12's.

A similar group and league type format occurred with the U12's as per the U14's, with 5 group stages in April and May being condensed down to 4 divisions in June and July. Sadly, only 3 of these divisions completed their fixtures schedule. CCC organised an U12 Blitz finals day across four venues for any club who wished to participate in August. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Sinead Casey for chasing up all of the U12 group and league scores throughout the season and recording them meticulously/ These will be invaluable when it comes to attempting to grade U14's in 2027. This age grade will require much consideration going into 2026.

The U16 and U18 league and championship for the most part proceeded without issue. A very condensed season with little wiggle room for both age grades in order to fit in a full league and championship. The minors competed for 3 months mid-May to mid-August quickly followed by the U16's competing for 3 months mid-August to mid-November. Playing numbers within some clubs, player protection during exam season, the condensed schedule and no room for injury recovery, resulted in almost double the number of conceded games at both these age grades this season compared with that in 2024, something that will need to be taken into consideration for 2026.

There have been 393 football fixtures scheduled on servasport this season for our youth and despite all of the hurdles, we still achieved a very respectable 90.07% fulfilment of football fixtures, which was equally as heartening as it was a relief.

The appetite for these games continues to increase with every successful season and their potential knows no limit.

As this aspect of our games development continues to flourish, we need to revisit it and how we best deliver it, to ensure that we continue to produce a legacy of development which enhances the football and hurling in our county for many years to come. A number of individuals have indicated that they would be keen to collaborate and shape the next stage of our go games development, building on the foundations in place and I look forward to working with them in this exciting endeavour for Fermanagh GAA.

Congratulations and very well done to all of the teams who have ventured outside the county to provincial and national competitions, Newtownbutler and Teemore football Féile na Peile, Naomh Aodhan and Lisbellaw St. Patricks for hurling Féile na nGael, always representing Fermanagh with great pride and honour. I have no doubt Derrygonnelly will produce their finest football in the St. Paul's Tournament next month. This year's incredible showcasing of our games, competitiveness & ever-increasing talent, is a credit to each club, coach, volunteer and player in our county. It is always with great thanks and appreciation to them, that we were able to fulfil our fixtures in football and hurling and bring our competitions to successful conclusions.

Once again, the hurling fixtures were featured in the Fermanagh GAA masterplan with the new addition of the Táin Óg Fixtures. There were six U14 teams, six U15 Féile teams, six U16 teams and four U18 teams all from Fermanagh this season.

Unfortunately however, a failure to adhere to the fixtures schedule and many other competing interests prevented multiple fixtures reaching their conclusions, greatly diminishing the integrity of the competitions resulting in only a 69.23% fixture fulfilment rate, due in large part due to an excellent group of U16's. It would be greatly hoped that we can bring these U16's through to minor and the excellent group of U12's from 2024 should produce an excellent U14 season in 2026.

The hurling Go Games dates were included in the masterplan once again this season. Unfortunately however, there really were no hurling blitzes fulfilled properly, aside from those that were Memorial Blitzes, which was disappointing. If we are not coaching our fundamentals as early as possible, I fear that there will be no teams to follow the great numbers and interest that there is at U12 and u14, which would truly be a travesty. It is no secret that the volunteer base within hurling in Fermanagh is small, overburdened and exhausted from keeping the show on the road thus far. But without an injection of new energy, fresh volunteers and innovative idea's going forward, we jeopardise the future potential of Fermanagh hurling.

At the Hurling Development Roadshow in Garvaghy Centre of Excellence in May, the new National Head of Hurling, William Maher listened to many of the concerns relayed by the Ulster counties, concerns which all seem to be universal. It was a positive meeting and hopefully when they study the performance metric's and participation trends, their strategic focus will see benefits for smaller hurling counties like Fermanagh. The introduction of a new Hurling Games Participation Officer within Fermanagh will also be a welcome addition.

This season saw a Fermanagh U16 Poc Fada competition take place amongst Lisbellaw, Belnaleck, Enniskillen, Lisnaskea and Naomh Aodhan. Ben Plamer from Belnaleck advanced to the Ulster Poc Fada to represent Fermanagh in Glenarm on June 17th. A welcome addition to our hurling repertoire.

Other noteworthy developments in Fermanagh hurling saw the extensive redevelopment of the Knocks Grattan's grounds and the establishment of a new hurling club between Belcoo and Blacklion, MacNean Hurling. Both of which are heartening to see.

Comhghairdeas to all this season's football and hurling winners at Minor, U16, Féile and U14. Our commiserations to the runners up and those who narrowly missed out on the top two spots.

We truly have a great association in the GAA comprising of some of the best and most committed volunteers that any association could ask for, who are deeply rooted at its core. We have the ability to offer our youth, avenues to grow as individuals through sports, through culture, through heritage, and to offer adults and coaches development through administration and coaching, as well as a meaningful support network at the heart of everything we do incorporating many generations into one unique organisation.

The amount of excellent work done by GAA volunteers across Fermanagh is inspirational and often quite humbling. In most cases the commitment, hours, and devotion all too often goes unseen and unnoticed. Every dedicated volunteer is vitally important in shaping our youth for the future, leading by example, providing a safe environment for players to learn, grow, develop, and prosper, not only as players but as individuals.

The County Board owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to all of those clubs who organise their own tournaments, blitzes and competitions throughout the year in addition to the scheduled league, championship and Féile fixtures, notably in football the Gerard Cox Derrygonnelly Tournament, the Tommy Durnien Memorial Tournament, the Hugh Cathcart Kinawley Tournament, Óisín McGovern Teemore Tournament, Paul Bogue Tempo Tournament and in hurling the Joe Maguire Memorial Tournament Ederney, Jim Dundas Memorial Tournament Lisnaskea and Shane Mulholland Memorial Tournament Lisbellaw. Any tournament or series of games organised over and above the Bord na nÓg schedule, is a credit to the clubs taking the initiative to orchestrate them and only serves to

further improve our young, improve their fundamentals across the board and most importantly their enjoyment of our games.

We wish to acknowledge the work of Cumann na mBunscol and the teachers in our schools throughout the county who participate in and promote the Cumann na mBunscol competitions, training our youth and further promoting and enriching our games. I wish to take this opportunity to thank John Prunty, Cumann na mBunscol Secretary for providing an excellent detailed report for the 2025 season and always being an integral link between the Youth Board and Cumann na mBunscol throughout the year.

The tremendous work done by the Fermanagh Competitions and Controls Committee headed up by Chairperson John McGovern and CCC Secretary Phil Flanagan is unrivalled. John, Phil and all the CCC members have an exceptionally difficult task orchestrating our annual master plan and trying to accommodate everything. An almost impossible task to please everyone, but John, Phil and the CCC members do an incredible job in the delivery of achievable master plans and often receive more criticism than deserved praise. However, we only ever strive to do our best, to be innovative in what we schedule to deliver and to offer competitive, meaningful games for all ages in the county.

I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank Phil for the tremendous work he does for Fermanagh GAA, especially this season when he done the Lion's share of the Adult and Youth fixtures whilst I concentrated on my studies and he continued to do so for the remainder of the season. The masterplan he proposed to CCC was ambitious and he seen it through to fruition. Thank you Phil for your hard work and tireless efforts to advance Fermanagh GAA. Because we have both been doing what we do for so long now, If this season in particular, has taught either of us anything is that we need to educate others around us and share the knowledge we have to ease these burdens going forward. Hopefully the results yielded from the CCC Underage Competition Review questionnaire will be an excellent asset, helping guide our decisions for the season ahead.

To our Children's Officer, Anita Kehoe, whom co-ordinates with club Children's officers and Designated Officers, keeps on top of our vetting processes, provides safe guarding training and training updates, ensuring that we in Fermanagh GAA are creating and maintaining the safest possible service and environment for our young people, we thank her for her diligence.

Anita is an absolute lady. Open minded, highly skilled and motivated in her role and always approachable. Her role continues to grow in importance and significance in our games and there is no better woman in Fermanagh to do the job as well as she does. Fermanagh GAA are very lucky to have someone of Anita's calibre in the role.

The implementation of silent sidelines in the county in 2024 reduced Anita's workload greatly. This initiative was to allow our children to just "play" and "enjoy" our games without the negativity from our sidelines. It was a success and whilst 2025 may have seen this initiative's standards slip somewhat, hopefully new plans will see it continues to improve once again next season and reinforce the respect deserved by all on our sidelines.

Many thanks should be conveyed to our county coaches, coaching our games throughout the county at primary and post-primary level. This coaching is invaluable to our youth and their development. Much credit must go to our county coaches' commitment continuing to deliver this service along with the additional demands of Academy activities. I wish to take this opportunity to thank Pat Cadden

for his service to Fermanagh GAA. Pat's departure from Fermanagh Coaching and Games is most regrettable but we wish him all the very best with his next endeavor.

Congratulations to Fermanagh Coaching and Games Officer Stephen McElrone in a very productive first year in his role. Acknowledging the gaps in our secondary school delivery, has made advancements and appointments there, whilst continuing to pursue Croke Park for more attractive career prospects with competitive salaries for additional coaching staff in the county. There has been a significant increase in the number of courses and workshops available for developing players, building teams and strengthening clubs. Stephen has also immersed himself in academies improvements whilst delivering a Go Games schedule in my absence this season. Fair to say he has hit the ground running.

A special word of thanks must go to Teresa McNabb, the Games Development Manager. Teresa does a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes for coaching and games development within Fermanagh, all too often unnoticed and we are so fortunate to have her lead this team of coaches, as professionally and diligently as she does. Another lady who is incredibly busy with Fermanagh GAA commitments but still manages to immerse herself in club activities and maintain a very busy household. We are so grateful for the time, dedication and selfless commitment you give to this county and the advancement of our games.

I wish to commend Gerard McLaughlin, Hurling Referee Appointments Officer, Fergal Cleary, Football Referee's Appointments Officer and Dermott Love, Referee's Administrator for their difficult jobs in appointing referees to officiate all of our games, often under challenging and strenuous circumstances. Our thanks and gratitude extend to each and every referee this season, who do an incredible and thankless job. We thank them for all their commitment, dedication and assistance in ensuring that our youth fixtures run efficiently. As always, we need many more referees in the county and would urge all clubs to consider new individuals to put forward to help the referee's committee. The days of referee's performing their duties at up to three fixtures on one day alone, is not sustainable and shouldn't be acceptable either.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Brian Armitage for his support, confidence, and counsel as Fermanagh County Chairperson. I wish to express my sincere gratitude to County Secretary Tom Boyle and County Treasurer Sean Burns for their continued help, guidance, and encouragement throughout the season. I would like to acknowledge the help of the County PRO Deirdre Donnelly in trying to ensure that the excellent sporting activities provided for our Gaels, are advertised on our social media platforms and given the recognition that they truly deserve, highlighting the tremendous amount of work that goes on behind the scenes. I wish all of those vacating their positions the very best of luck in their future endeavours.

I wish to welcome Peter Bogue to the Hurling Development Committee and acknowledge the continued hard work and dedication of Hurling Development Committee Secretary Roísín Smyth. I look forward to working closely with them both again in the future. There is a keen desire to develop the hurling structures already in place and positive aspirations to see Fermanagh Hurling progress to the next levels. However, the small hurling community within the county functioning with a skeleton of highly motivated volunteers, is so exhausted and overwhelmed from years of struggling and trying to keep the spark of hurling alive in the county. We need to address the issue of how we get more coaches and volunteers developed and trained to help relieve the pressures in hurling. We need to get these coaches into our primary schools delivering dedicated hurling programmes as early as possible. Hopefully some of these concerns will be addressed by the newly appointed Hurling Games

Participation Officer.

In conclusion, I would particularly like to thank most sincerely, all club delegates and for their patience throughout the year. I acknowledge that this year was very different to others and appreciate that youth delegates didn't feel that they had a voice this season. On behalf of the Bord na nÓg, we apologise if this was indeed the case and are committed to ensuring your clubs youth delegates voice is once again heard in 2026 at the monthly Fermanagh Bord na nÓg meetings. We understand more than ever the essential and integral part these monthly meetings play in ensuring we are delivering a programme of games that our players want and our clubs buy into, that their concerns and reservations are heard and acknowledged in the appropriate forum and that any decision made about the future and direction our games are going in is a collective one and in the best interests of Fermanagh GAA.

We truly value our Youth Delegates very necessary input for our Bord na nÓg meetings, our plans, and our decisions. They are the most important link we have with our clubs and youth players and are a fundamental part of our development as a county, as a whole. We require our Youth Delegates from both football and hurling on board, attending the Bord na nÓg meetings and helping steer our games and initiatives in both codes, developing both codes going forward into 2026 and ensuring a solid grounding for the legacy we wish to leave behind. We are committed to ensuring that the voices of the youth delegates are once again placed at the heart of all decisions taken concerning our youth.

It is my honour to be in the position of Secretary of the Bord na nÓg now for nine years. Whilst this season ultimately resulted in a prioritisation of my career and studies, it by no means diminished my appetite or desire to aspire for better for Fermanagh GAA. We are passionate about our county, we love these games, we are proud to be a small part of a very busy and hard working Fermanagh County Board. And whilst it may not always be apparent and we may not always agree, the youth of Fermanagh GAA are always at the heart of our decisions.

I wish at this time to offer my sincere condolences to those families, who have lost loved ones over the course of the season. Ar dheis Dé go raibh said. May they rest in peace. Whilst it is not my intention to single any individual out, it would be remise of me not to acknowledge the tragic passing of Lisbellaw Youth Board Delegate Vanessa Whyte and her children James and Sara. Vanessa and I got on very well and were quite alike in our thought processes on the dual player in Fermanagh. A lady never afraid to speak her mind, express her opinion or indeed hold people to account. A lady that lived for the promotion of hurling in Lisbellaw and Fermanagh and always on the Maguiresbridge sidelines for the children's football matches. A lady who made her mark on us all, whom we will all miss dearly and remember fondly.

I look forward to once again working with new and returning officers within the county and I am sure I am not alone in looking forward in anticipation to a New Year and a season full of even more fixtures and hopefully less turbulent obstacles and challenges in 2026!

Leáine Nic an Phríora - Runaí Coiste na nÓg

Tuarascáil Choiste Oiliúna agus Forbartha Cluichí (Coaching and Games Development Committee)

A chairde,

During 2025, the Coaching and Games Committee targeted several key changes which we are pleased to report have now been implemented. The main focus areas were the expansion of the Go Games programme, the restructuring of staffing and academy systems, and the enhancement of coach education.

While significant progress has been made, we recognise there is still more to do. The committee will again set ambitious targets for 2026 to ensure that every young player within Fermanagh GAA is given the best opportunity to become the best version of themselves.

Football Go Games

The Go Games programme had a major increase in volume in 2025.

- U7.5: 8 rounds
- U8.5: 14 rounds
- U10.5: 12 rounds + 5 blitzes

All clubs participated in either the Derrygonnelly or Lisnaskea Emmetts tournaments, which added four further rounds and a blitz. This provided 15 weeks of football for U10.5 players.

Overall, Go Games dates increased from 20 in 2024 to 37 in 2025 — a significant expansion which we aim to maintain in 2026.

Average attendance rose from 60% at the start of the year to 80% once a structured fixture calendar was introduced. This also ensured a shared hosting responsibility. Hosting requires organisation, but it is extremely rewarding, supported by the excellent facilities in Fermanagh clubs.

U12 Football Programme

The U12 league consisted of 10 rounds and was incorporated into the Go Games structure due to the ongoing shortage of referees. Despite requests to clubs to train referees, only St Mary's Maguiresbridge and St Joseph's Ederney responded.

Experience shows that competitive games overseen by club mentors is not a sustainable model. Therefore, unless referee recruitment increases significantly, no structural changes will be made to the U12 league in 2026.

Football Games Programme

In collaboration with the CCC, a bi-weekly games calendar was introduced, similar to the successful model used in other counties. This provided players with an extended season at their own age grade, moving away from the traditional "league and championship window."

The expanded calendar brought clear benefits but also challenges — particularly around scheduling relating to inter-county U17 commitments, the Fermanagh Senior Championship, and the overlapping competitions for U16–U18 players.

A survey has been issued by the CCC to gather feedback from players, coaches, and mentors to help refine next year's programme.

Hurling

The 2025 hurling programme opened positively with participation in the Táin Óg Hurling League and spring Academy Hurling.

However, our hurling community was deeply impacted during the summer by the tragic passing of Vanessa Whyte, her son James Rutledge, and daughter Sara Rutledge. This heartbreaking event brought understandable disruption to the programme, and the thoughts of everyone in Fermanagh GAA remain with their family and the wider Lisbellaw and hurling communities. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a n-anamacha.

Upon resumption, the U12, U14, and U16 competitions recommenced, producing some excellent hurling with strong representation across the county. Participation levels in hurling are now higher than ever, which is extremely encouraging.

Nonetheless, challenges remain at Go Games level, particularly around volunteer availability and player numbers. The Coaching and Games Committee have focused on hurling-specific coach education over the winter to help address these issues, but clubs must also recruit and support new volunteers to ensure fixtures are fulfilled according to the county masterplan.

A particular well done to all clubs who competed in the Fermanagh Junior Hurling Competition during the summer. This was an excellent addition to the playing calendar and highlighted the continued growth of the game in the county.

Camps

Fermanagh hosted 14 Kellogg's Cúl Camps and 3 Erne Camps in 2025.

Our Player Development Camps for teenagers were especially successful, running during the summer and again at Halloween. The Halloween camps attracted over 250 teenage players both male and female, demonstrating the strong appetite for development opportunities.

Restructuring and Staffing

The Coaching and Games budget was restructured in 2025, with greater investment directed towards post-primary schools. Clubs were asked to support the continuation of primary school coaching, and we are very grateful for the strong level of engagement. This collective backing has allowed for an expanded overall budget.

At post-primary level:

- St Michael's College, Enniskillen employed Niall McElroy (Tempo Maguires) as GAA Development Manager, part-funded by Fermanagh GAA.
- St Kevin's College, Lisnaskea employed a full-time Games Promotion Officer.
- A part-time Gaelic Games Officer was facilitated at Mount Lourdes.
- Support was also extended to St Aidan's Derrylin, St Joseph's Enniskillen, St Mary's Irvinestown, and South West College.

This area remains a priority and further investment is encouraged.

Academy

A sincere word of thanks to all volunteers who worked with our Academy squads in 2025. Training volumes increased significantly thanks to the commitment and enthusiasm of our coaches.

The programme was designed to respect club commitments while enabling players to train and compete with peers at their own level. However, we recognise the need for continued improvement. Fermanagh remains behind provincial and national standards in player development, and we must close this gap.

In January 2026, academy players will attend an induction day, where each will be profiled and recorded in a development database. Parents will also attend workshops focusing on nutrition, S&C, and athletic development.

Attendance and commitment will be essential going forward. Unfortunately, some players may not continue if they do not engage fully — as significant time and resources are being invested in those who show commitment.

Coach Education

Coach development was a major focus in late 2025 and will continue into 2026.

We held our first Coaching Conference in partnership with St Michael's College, focusing on club structures and player development.

We also welcomed Kevin Kelly, Ulster GAA Provincial Hurling Manager, who delivered two workshops on development structures and volunteer pathways.

Progress in coaching qualifications continues to grow:

30 coaches completed the Level 1 course.

10 coaches completed the Level 2 course — the first Level 2 group ever completed in Fermanagh, marking a milestone achievement.

Focus for 2026

Key priorities for the coming year include:

- Expanded Academy support through pitch-based training alongside increased S&C and player education.
- Continued development of modified games programmes, including small-sided formats similar to the successful U16 7-a-side competition.
- Further increasing attendance and participation at Go Games level.

Closing Remarks

I would like to express my sincere thanks to everyone involved in Coaching and Games throughout 2025 — our full-time staff, volunteers, committee members, coaches, and club officers — for your outstanding commitment and passion in promoting Gaelic Games within Fermanagh.

Finally, I wish all players, mentors, officials, and supporters a happy and peaceful Christmas, and a successful and rewarding 2026 both on and off the field.

Tuarascáil Cheannaire na gCluichí

(Head of Games' Report)

This report outlines the key achievements, developments, and challenges across all Coaching & Games programmes delivered throughout 2025. The Coaching & Games team continued to prioritise player development, club support and coach education, ensuring that Gaelic Games remain strong in every Club across Fermanagh.

Primary Schools Programme

A full Primary Schools coaching programme was delivered from January to June 2025. In September, a new restructured model was introduced, aligning school support more closely with club needs. Of the 25 primary schools, 19 Primary School have requested additional coaching support and 6 required no additional support.

Ulster GAA Regional Hurling Officer Patrick Delaney provides coaching to feeder Primary Schools and Fermanagh Coach Megan McCann can also provide Handball support to Clubs in their feeder schools who are engaging in setting up hubs for players to access.

Post-Primary Schools Programme



7 Post Primary Schools have received support in skill development, strength and conditioning, competition preparation, Team support and player education. Player development at this Post Primary School age is one of the key focus areas for Coaching and games to give greater support and investment.

Fermanagh GAA are delighted to partner with St Michael's College, Mount Lourdes Grammar (in conjunction with Fermanagh LGFA), St

Kevin's College and South West College to continue to enhance opportunities for young players.

- 450 players (boys & girls) attend two Post Primary School blitz days in Lissan for Yr8 & Yr9 in June
- St Michaels U15.5 teams won The Corn De Danann Final in February defeating Colaiste Feirste 7-07 to 4-04.
- St Aidan's won their first-ever Ulster Schools' hurling title defeating St Malachy's Castlwellan on a scoreline of 3-02 to 1-03 in February.
- St Kevin's College U13.5 won the Danske Bank McKee Plate in April defeating St Joseph's, Newry.
- South West College made history by claiming the prestigious Corn na Mac Léinn for the first time defeating New York 5-12 to 2-07.

Games Programmes

Thanks to CCC and Phil Flanagan for a comprehensive programme of games this season which was scheduled across football and hurling. Fixture scheduling remains a significant challenge, but CCC, with Coaching & Games support, facilitated a broad calendar of meaningful competitions, including facilitating National Academy and school fixtures into the calendar. Players need as many opportunities to experience meaningful, development-focused competitive games throughout the season.

Fermanagh is part of a national pilot exploring adapted games formats to enhance participation and development opportunities through clubs and schools - Sligo, Longford and Leitrim are the other 3

counties involved in the pilot.

CCC organised the U16 Small Sided Games 7-aside ran at start of season in the Bawnacre to provide games for none County players – this was a positive initiative; Coaching & Games in conjunction with CCC hope to explore the possible of a larger calendar of adapted games for different age cohorts and codes.

- 16 clubs participated in National League half-time games.
- Hurling Go Games indoor series delivered across three dates in March
- U13 Football pilot programme (2 players from each club) featuring six coaching sessions and two internal games.

Go Games

This year's Fermanagh Go Games Programme was coordinated by County Coaching Officer Stephen McElrone. A planned schedule of dates was organised for the U7.5, U8.5, U10.5 and U12 age groups, with a significant increase in the number of blitz opportunities offered.

The programme was delivered using a blended approach, combining:

- · Multi-club blitzes at designated venues, and
- Standalone fixtures to allow greater flexibility over the summer period.

Games played:

- U7.5 -- 260 games
- U8.5 220 games
- U10.5 173 games
- U12 142 games

Thank you to Stephen for his weekly coordination and communication with clubs. The Go Games Programme is an important part of the player development pathway. It is imperative that clubs attend as many blitz opportunities as possible and ensure that our players are provided with the right environment in which to learn.

Go Games are small-sided game opportunities. For the best possible development, we should be providing 5-, 6-, 7-, 8- or 9-a-side games. Piling as many players as possible onto the pitch serves no purpose and does not support effective player development.

Well done to all the Clubs and Coaches who attended and hosted Go Games Blitzes.

Well done also to Derrygonnelly and Lisnaskea Clubs who annually organise the U10.5 blitz Programme which all clubs look forward to each year.

Finally well done to all Clubs who organise various Go Games and Youth Blitzes within the County. Small Sided Games / Adapted Games programmes will become part our games offering in the future and serve as another development piece along our players pathway.

Cúl Camps & Development Camps

Cúl Camps attracted 973 participants in 2025, with a further 102 children attending Erne Camps. Across Easter, Summer, and Halloween, a total of 473 players engaged in development-focused camps.

Halloween Player Development Camps included:

- St Michael's College 104 participants
- St Aidan's Derrylin 55 participants
- Lisnaskea 53 participants
- Mount Lourdes (Female) 54 participants

Numbers are back on Cúl Camps, a few factors impacting; cost of camps, availability of coaches & Coach to Child ratio policy. There is a large interest in Youth player development camps,



young players looking to improve and learning from senior intercounty role modules and top coaches.

Talent Academy Progress

The Talent Academy offered structured programmes for U14–U17 squads, each receiving technical, tactical and athletic development as well as player education. All squads completed their national fixtures.

U14 Development squads completed three structured blocks of coaching after school and travelled to Sligo for two competitive games.

The U15 Football Academy completed their season with strong player engagement, and a lot of close competitive contests, players put in a good season of development work.

U16 squad represented Fermanagh in the Gerry Reilly Shield competition, beating Tipperary by a point in the semi-final to reach Gerry Reilly Sheild against Antrim played in Lisnaskea losing by 8points.

The U15 Hurling Academy finished top of their group and reached the All-Ireland Hibernia Cup Final, narrowly losing to Longford by a point 3-09 to 2-13. The players showed great development throughout their group games and played some great hurling in the final, losing out by a last minute free.

Celtic Challenge team had another strong season, winning the Minor Development League against Monaghan in the Bawnacre and reaching their respective Celtic Challenge final, losing out to a strong Longford 3-13 to 2-10.

County Minor Football team had a difficult season, up against the top teams in the Country in the Ulster Minor League. The team did put in a good performance in their All-Ireland Tier competition against Longford in Roslea, unfortunately coming up short 1-10 to 0-11.

As part of our Academy Player Development structure, players received targeted education in key performance areas. At our Easter Academy Player Development day featured nutrition workshops, leadership and County values presentations, video analysis, and athletic development and match preparation.

Inclusion – GAA for ALL

Inclusive coaching programme in 2025, involved weekly coaching delivered to Willowbridge School and the Fresh Focus Group in Enniskillen, with Fresh Focus services users and staff also participating in the GAA for ALL Activity Day in Croke Park.

Well done to Brookeborough GAA who successfully launched a weekly GAA for ALL coaching hub, demonstrating strong demand for inclusive sport and we were happy to support St Pat's Donagh who run their All-Stars Summer Camp - Well done everyone!

Coach Education & CPD

Coach Education remains a priority, with a full calendar of ICGG and CPD workshops delivered across the county. A total of 8 ICGG courses and more than 12 CPD workshops were delivered, involving over 230 coaches. Workshops included Nursery, New Rules, Goalkeeping workshops, Athletic Development sessions, and Award 1 & Award 2 qualifications.

Coach Education in 2026 will remain at the forefront of Coaching & Games priorities, providing coaches with knowledge and skills needed to develop players effectively.

Hurling Development



Hurling participation continues to grow, showing strong engagement at academy and school level. Our hurling Go Games Programme needs attention; numbers of games being played has been very low. The Hurling Development Camp attracted 33 players and offered high-quality coaches and games opportunities, which was kindly sponsored by the Shane Mulholland Foundation and supported by the GPA and FODC. It is extremely positive to see the strives within newly formed

unit MacNean Hurling, it's great to see players and coaches in the Belcoo area getting involved, the more teams we can have playing, the better games programmes we can structure and offer.

Coaching and Games were delighted with the uptake from 4 interested hurling clubs to get involved in a Participation Officer pilot initiative, Hurling Club contributed to a PO who would coach 1 day a week in their local feeder schools create a stronger School-Club link and increase participation.

The hurling fraternity was rocked in the summertime with the tragic loss of Vanessa, James and Sara, we keep their family, friends and teammates in our thoughts and prayers, they are sadly missed.

(Referees' Administration Committee)

Introduction

I would like to begin this report by thanking the referees within the County for their efforts and commitment during the 2025 season and members of CCC who have provided consistent support to referees during the season. There are various aspects to refereeing and the brief seems to be changing every year and with another plethora of rule changes introduced for 2025 the season generated several challenges.

There were 300 Youth game referee appointments in 2025, in 2024 there were 409. The decrease from last year is due to U-12 football leagues being under the 'Go-Games' format with no referees appointed. There were 291 Adult game referee appointments in 2025, in 2024 there were 308.

Training

For those who are unaware, all referees MUST complete PSNI/Garda vetting, safeguarding training, Rules test and fitness tests before stepping onto a pitch. These are the minimum standards as indicated by Croke Park and I'm pleased to report the Fermanagh panel of referees meet these standards. The introduction of new rules this year was a seismic change for everyone, and I would hope that all Gaels recognise the efforts Referee's went to whilst ensuring compliance and fairness are upheld simultaneously. We had hoped to secure the services of some new Assessors this year but unfortunately this task slipped and remains a focus for 2026. The referee committee do have a mentoring programme for new referees and this successful initiative will also continue for the foreseeable future.

Championship

The County Championship format this year was again highly successful but came at a cost to referees. The logistics around providing 4 officials for some championship games on the same day and at different locations can be challenging. Again, I would like to thank the referees for their commitment and diligence during this period. On reflection of the Championship referees found the most difficult aspect was securing umpires for their respective games. I understand that refereeing isn't for everyone, but I urge clubs to do more to support your referee and put endeavour to secure a reliable team of umpires.

Referees are currently getting more support for their umpiring duties from their refereeing peers rather than their own club. So much coverage is rightly directed to the "respect" campaign, but I can confirm that sending numerous text messages or making phone calls hours before a game trying to secure a final umpire is every bit as stressful has been challenged on the football pitch.

The Championship format was overall a great opportunity for referees, and we had the opportunity to officiate in highly competitive games which will benefit all aspects of Fermanagh football going forward. This season the Senior championship final once again required a replay and this gave an opportunity to two referees. Congratulations to Barry Monaghan and James Lewis who contributed to the spectacle and excitement of both matches.

Games

The table below indicates the percentage of games each referee officiated in 2025 in comparison to the 2024 season. CCC recommends that each club officiates a minimum of 3% of the total games

each season. Erne Gaels have a lower percentage as Niall Cullen has limited availability due to his Inter County commitments. The table does however indicate that some clubs are carrying a heavier burden than others and hopefully this anomaly can be addressed before the 2026 season commences. It's a credit to Fermanagh referees and particularly our Appointments Officer (Fergal Cleary) that nearly 700 games were covered in Fermanagh this year, this figure doesn't include school's fixtures or Ad-Hoc challenge games arranged sporadically throughout the season.

Hurling

Hurling continues to develop within Fermanagh and once again referees are playing their part. I would like to thank the hurling referees for their continued commitment to hurling within the county. The referees are now extending themselves further and have been officiating at provincial level (Gerry McLaughlin & Michael Keown) which once again illustrates their commitment to the progression of the game. Fermanagh had 40 scheduled hurling matches last season and although that figure is small in comparison to other counties the growth should in the last few years is a credit to all involved.

National Level

Fermanagh has a small panel of referees and yet continues to generate quality officials who excel at National Level. Niall Cullen has been representing his County and club with great aplomb in recent years and was once again retained on the National League panel for 2025. Eoin Murphy and James Lewis are included within the Provincial panel for 2025, and James was just recently appointed to referee the Ulster Club Junior final. We wish Niall, James, and Eoin well in the future and we hope that others can see the opportunities that can be availed of.

Ladies Football

Ladies football in Fermanagh is thriving and once again referees are playing their part. We are again talking about the same group of people, nearly half the current refereeing panel are doubling up to referee ladies' football. This again demonstrates the commitment of the current panel where they have additional rules to learn notwithstanding the continuing pressures of time and other resources. I would urge all clubs to encourage some more ladies take up refereeing, especially those who have recently retired from the game, their experience of ladies' football should be retained. I would also like to congratulate Shane Connolly and Shane McGoldrick who are making their mark at provincial level.

Recruitment

Refereeing isn't easy, it is physically and mentally demanding, but it is rewarding. The refereeing committee have tried numerous approaches to recruit referees with some limited success but regrettably the most successful method of recruitment is proving to be the threat of removing home games. This approach is by no means favoured but clubs must realise that referees (like footballers) have a shelf life. 30% of the current refereeing panel are over 50 years of age and clubs need to prepare for their inevitable retirement, so please be proactive, help your club and county and take recruitment seriously. I will remind all clubs that all referees must complete PSNI/Garda vetting, this is the responsibility of the referee and their respective club. Many thanks to the efforts of clubs who have provided new referees this season Maguiresbridge (Paul Traynor), Ederney (Aarron Dennison) and Garrett Mac Enri (Teemore) made a return to refereeing. Two new referees in Fermanagh within one year is an excellent result in comparison to previous years, I hope this development continues.

Conclusion

This year has proved once again, difficult for Referees and although recent initiatives such as "silent sidelines" has been a good forward step, we are still well short of an acceptable standard with regards to player and supporter behaviour. There are however many positive moments, matches and events and it's important to focus on this.

Sadly, since County Convention last year, one of our own, John Murphy passed away, a young man who had refereed for many years, representing his club Derrygonnelly Harps with pride. Ar Dheis Dé go raibh a anam dílis.

I would finally, on behalf of the Refereeing Panel thank everyone for their kindness and support during the 2025 season especially the members of CCC and the County Chairman who work tirelessly on our behalf.

Tuarascáil Choiste Sábháilteachta agus Áiseanna (Safety and Facilities Commitee Report)

LISSAN FACILITIES

Lissan has been maintained to a high standard throughout the year. A key improvement was the move to St. Michael's pitch from May, providing an excellent training surface for the championship run. Several upgrades were completed, including an upgrade to the wind turbine in August, the installation of new stop nets on the bottom pitch, and the commissioning of new LED floodlights on the top pitch in September. Thanks are extended to Joe Prunty for his excellent pitch maintenance and to Liam Keenan for his superb site management.

ASHWOODS ROAD STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT

Following the announcement at last year's AGM, the purchase of 24 acres at Ashwoods Road, Enniskillen, has been successfully completed. Environmental and traffic surveys are finished, and we are now proceeding with appointing an architect and compiling full cost estimates for a major new twin-site development.

This project is central to our long-term strategy, anticipating the future amalgamation of the GAA and LGFA. The new facility will complement the ongoing role of Lissan and will include:

- Three floodlit pitches
- A strength and conditioning hub, recovery suite, and meeting rooms
- County offices and catering facilities
- Car parking and a stadium pitch for competitive matches

This is a multi-generational project that will provide a footprint for future development. The strategy is to develop the site in phases:

Phase 1 (2026–2030): Design, planning, and procurement, followed by the construction of two full-size training pitches and one competitive match pitch with changing facilities, a Performance Hub, and initial parking.

Phase 2 (2030-2035): Development of a sports pavilion with a stand, four changing rooms, a multipurpose hall, office accommodation, kitchen, and treatment rooms.



Funding discussions are ongoing with Croke Park, Fermanagh and Omagh District Council, and Club Eirne.

BREWSTER PARK

A grant of £134k has been secured from the Croke Park National Infrastructure Fund to install circa 4,000 new spectator seats, replacing the old wooden benches in the John Vesey Stand. This development, which will be supported by the Ulster Council, Enniskillen Gaels, and the County Board, forms part of an overall project, which also includes the provision of a new toilet block. The total project cost is £420k for both the toilets and seating with the County Board and Enniskillen Gaels contributing 50%. All works are scheduled for completion by late April 2026.

CLUB DEVELOPMENTS

It is encouraging to see widespread facility improvements across our clubs. A summary of club projects is provided below:

Aghadrumsee St Macartans:

• Upgraded pitch floodlights, installed a tarmacked walkway with low-level lighting around both pitches. Plans for 2026 include entrance enhancements and clubroom roof repairs.

Belcoo O'Rahillys:

• Construction of a new Hub (gym, changing rooms, meeting space) is well underway, supported by a fundraising draw.

Belnaleck Art McMurrough's

- Upgraded Pitch facility including training lights and opened new gym.
- Also played lead role with Community Association in securing planning permission for new Wellbeing community hub. Plans for year ahead include improving entrance and advancing wellbeing community hub facility.

Brookeborough Heber MacMahons:



 Recently completed a new gym, upgraded changing rooms, and a tarmacked car park with new gates. Future plans include developing a stand.

Coa O'Dwyer's



- Completed another stage of their development with the tarring of walk way and the erection of training and walking lights, new fencing and planting
- Carried out a number of fundraising events including a 5k / 10k run and a tractor run

Derrygonnelly Harps



2025

- Completed the gym and opened it to the public
- Secured planning permission and prepared the ground for a third grass training pitch.
- Fundraising: Held a very successful walkathon

2026 Plans

- A new roof was installed on the existing changing rooms to address recurrent leaks. Solar Panels and battery storage were also added to reduce carbon emissions and electricity bills.



Work is also well advanced on a range of other upgrades for 2026, including:

- the addition of a sensory room overlooking the main pitch;
- a new changing room at the training pitch;
- replacement seating in the spectator stand;
- a new scoreboard;
- a ball wall: and
- EV charging points.

Réamhrá

The past year has been a period of steady progress in developing the planning and training structures within Fermanagh GAA. Our work continues to be guided by the principles and supports offered through both Croke Park's National Planning and Training Unit and Ulster GAA's Club and County Development Department. Together, these partnerships have provided a strong framework for good governance, effective leadership, and long-term planning across our county and clubs.

The Planning and Training function plays a central role in strengthening how Fermanagh GAA operates—ensuring that our clubs, officers, and committees are equipped with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to lead effectively and to plan for sustainable growth.



At the heart of our annual development calendar is Club Officer Training, delivered in partnership with Ulster GAA at the beginning of each year.

This training remains the single most important opportunity for club officers—new and returning—to familiarise themselves with current GAA policies, administrative procedures, and best governance practice.

Attendance at these sessions has improved in recent years, but it is vital that every club avails fully of this annual induction and refresher training. It provides practical guidance on the roles of Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, PRO, and Health & Wellbeing Officer, as well as covering topics such as club governance, child safeguarding, and financial accountability.

Each club is encouraged to make this training a compulsory part of its officer handover process, ensuring continuity, consistency, and confidence in how our clubs are run.

2. Club Compás – the New Club Development Framework

During 2025, Fermanagh GAA began preparing for the rollout of Club Compás, the new national club development and health-check framework developed by Croke Park to replace Club Maith.



Club Compás is designed to help clubs measure and improve their performance across five key areas:

- 1. Governance & Leadership
- 2. Games Development
- 3. Community & Culture
- 4. Facilities & Operations
- 5. Communication & Engagement

This framework will provide a modern, online, self-assessment system to help clubs identify strengths, address gaps, and plan future priorities.

Over the coming year, the County Planning & Training Committee will work with Ulster GAA to

introduce Club Compás to all Fermanagh clubs, providing guidance and mentoring support to help clubs complete their assessments and set realistic development goals.

3. Fermanagh GAA Strategic Plan 2026-2029

Work is ongoing on the preparation of the Fermanagh GAA Strategic Plan 2026–2029, which will set out the county's vision, priorities, and actions for the next four years.

This process—led by the County Planning & Training Committee—has involved wide consultation across clubs, committees, schools, and community partners. The plan will align closely with:

- The GAA National Strategic Plan,
- The Ulster GAA Strategic Framework, and
- Fermanagh GAA's own development priorities in the areas of games participation, volunteer development, facilities, communications, and governance.

The final document will be launched in 2026 and will include clear objectives, measurable outcomes, and a robust implementation and review framework.

This plan will not only guide decision-making at county level but will also act as a reference for clubs preparing their own local development plans.

4. County Officer Development

As the responsibilities placed on county administrators continue to grow, the need for ongoing officer development and upskilling has become increasingly evident.

In collaboration with Ulster GAA and Croke Park, there is an opportunity to expand training provision for county officers and sub-committee members in areas such as:

- Governance and risk management
- Financial accountability and reporting
- Communications and media relations
- Equality, Diversity & Inclusion (EDI)
- · Strategic leadership and performance management

Such structured training will ensure that county officers are well-equipped to manage the evolving demands of our Association and to lead with confidence, integrity, and competence.

5. Looking Ahead

The year ahead offers an opportunity to:

- Embed Club Compás across all Fermanagh clubs.
- Achieve full attendance at Ulster GAA's annual Club Officer Training.
- Finalise and launch the Fermanagh GAA Strategic Plan 2026–2029.
- Develop a County Officer Development Programme tailored to local needs; and
- Continue building a culture of good governance, planning, and accountability at every level of the Association.

By investing in our people and planning strategically, Fermanagh GAA will continue to grow stronger, more inclusive, and more sustainable in the years ahead.

As I began my period as the officer I found it difficult to fathom how a talented county such as ours would allow things sink to rock bottom that there would be no Scór in the county.

Sadly, as I edged towards the final days of my term it became clear how it unfolded before I began my term: ambivalence from many clubs, a lack of respect or interest for cultural matters and an overall dearth of pride in our areas runs deep in several of our clubs. Whilst thankfully a small number of clubs do excel at providing opportunities for young people both, playing and non-playing members, the overall picture is one of bleakness. As an eternal optimist, I have not given up hope that our county would turn our ship around and aim to restore a semblance of pride in our Irish culture.

The county website is a crucial tool for accessing contact information and record keeping. It is key for fixtures and results as the stats show. The inclusion of the Ladies fixtures and results in 2025 was an important step in the integration process. The website has and will continue to be the main portal for accessing match tickets for our games.

There is a lot more potential for our website, the new Communications committee should investigate this in 2026 along with each sub-committee providing updates.

In this scenario please include contact details so that I can provide you with the new password. This has become the busiest aspect of the role but volumes are always manageable and the new system has certainly improved officer wait times.

(Children's Officer Report)

A Chairde,

As part of the remit of a County Children's Officer, a report has to be prepared for our Annual Convention.

Where we are in 2025?

- All clubs have a vetted Children's Officer in place.
- All clubs now have a Designated Officer in place.
- All clubs have their National Child Safeguarding statements displayed in all clubrooms/club areas
- Vetting and Safeguarding information is now available via Foireann (this is still a work in progress, some details are still missing clubs should follow up on this with Ulster GAA)
- Delivery of 23 face-to-face Safeguarding Level 1 courses across Fermanagh. A sincere thank you to all clubs and participants.
- Vetting through Access (NI) now completed via online application to save time and allow applicants to take ownership of their vetting. Teething problems seem to have become minimal.

Legal Requirements

All club executives, underage coaches, Children's Officers and our Child Safeguarding Tutors have roles to play in the delivery of the Code of Behaviour. Our daily practices will continue to remain our central focus and we must continue to legally implement our comprehensive Code of Behaviour.

Please be mindful that those within our clubs who are selected to work with Children must have mandatory requirements:

- 1. The must have attended the Gaelic Games Child Safeguarding Workshop.
- 2. They must be vetted through Access NI.
- 3. They must possess a minimum foundation coaching qualification received from GAA.

Planning ahead for 2026

In 2026 it would be my intention to continue the groundwork embedding Safeguarding into all clubs planning and my strategic plan shall include;

- Clubs appointing Children's Officers as per club constitutions.
- Clubs appointing Designated Officers and Deputy Designated Officers as per club constitutions.
- Clubs appointing a Determining Committee (who determine if a breach of the code has occurred) as per club constitutions.
- Clubs appointing a Hearings Committee (who review any alleged breaches of the code) as per club constitutions.
- Continued use of gaa.ie Children's Officers email addresses through clubs, meaning that information that needs to go directly to club Children's Officers can do so via designated email addresses.
- Ensure that Vetting is continuing in all clubs throughout 2026
- Ensure clubs access the face-to-face Safeguarding Level 1 training where needed.
- Training of Safeguarding Tutor to deliver both Level 2 (Childrens Officer) and Level 3 (Designated Officers) safeguarding training, and delivery of both courses to those who need it in Fermanagh.

• Clubs are asked to take responsibility for the coaches and mentors they appoint to work with their teams. Some of the behaviour I have witnessed first-hand this year falls far short of the standards some clubs would hold themselves to, but yet it is accepted because "we don't have volunteers breaking down the door of the club to take teams" or "he/she is a great clubperson". That is not good enough. Take ownership and hold people working with our young people to account.

Thanks

Finally, in closing, a sincere 'thank you' to our outgoing County Chairman and Designated Officer Brian Armitage. He has allowed me the freedom to give Safeguarding the platform it needs, and it is no doubt down to his pro-active approach that we do things so well in Fermanagh. Wishing you all the very best Brian.

Thank you also to our County Secretary Tom Boyle, Vice Chairperson John McGovern, CCC Secretary Phil Flanagan, Hearings Secretary Connor McBarron, PRO Deirdre Felloni, Youth Secretary Leanne Prior, Coaching Officer Stephen McElrone, Head of Games Teresa McNabb and the county coaching team, for their strong support in all things Safeguarding and helping me make our county one where young people feel safe when participating in our games.

I thank all members of our Determining and Hearings Committee who were called upon this year. It is not an easy task, thankfully not over-used, but they continue to play a vital role in ensuring the Code of Behaviour is upheld.

To the Clubs of Fermanagh and their Children's Officers, thank you for putting your faith in me. To Ulster Council, especially Head of Safeguarding Bernie Fox and the Safeguarding Manager Ciara McGrory, and to our National Children's Officer Michelle Harte, I extend my heartfelt thanks.

To Conclude

When I deliver Safeguarding Courses, I am reminded of why we want our young people to play our games.

"We want our underage players to benefit from and participate in our Gaelic Games in a safe and enjoyable environment where our Games are conducted in a spirit of fair play."

It is such a privilege for me to travel around our clubs and see first-hand the excellent work that is ongoing. Well done to you all.

I urge clubs who now begin the process of appointing coaches and mentors to their teams to think carefully about the people given those roles and given the opportunity to work with our young players.

Take ownership of those people, take responsibility for their actions and set the bar high.

Remember, it's not a problem until the calves are out through the gap! By that stage, it's too late...

I am glad to present to you my treasurers report for the year ended 30/09/2025.

Like many clubs in the county, it has been a challenging year trying to maximise income in order to balance the day to day running costs of teams and coaching along with much needed and sustainable development of county infrastructure. It has been my pleasure to have worked with a tremendous team of dedicated volunteers from gate people, stewards, match officials, Fermanagh GAA TV workers and County committee members.

At the risk of repeating myself I feel I should again state the obvious that the GAA must, when allocating support funding to counties, address the imbalance between the larger counties which have wide opportunities for commercial income and the smaller ones who despite loyal support from a limited number of sponsors, will never be able to match their larger neighbours.

This year seen us successfully complete the acquisition of additional land close to Enniskillen, thus fulfilling our longstanding objective of securing a base for increased training facilities to supplement the Lissan facility. I thank everyone involved in the process, for their assistance and perseverance, in getting it across the line. The work starts right away now to develop and deliver the facilities onsite which will assist our young people to be the best that they can be in the future in order to represent our county with pride. I encourage all the Gaels of Fermanagh to support us in this work over the next few years.

The Ashwoods project will require a large increase in income over the next 5 years and in light of this I have proposed that the County appoint a Commercial Manager who could operate on a part time basis for a fixed term, with specific responsibility for increasing commercial income in association with the treasurer and other members of management committee to deliver on our Ashwoods business plan.

I thank all our sponsors and in particular our main sponsors Tracey Concrete Ltd, Mannok, Monaghan Bros, O'Neills, Modern Tyres, Mc Mahon Confectionery, Beltertech, Westville Hotel, Crust and Crumb, Cadco, B Mc Caffrey & Sons and Peter Carty.

Club Eirne members and contributors have again delivered tremendous financial assistance, without which we would not be able to provide high level support for our County teams Coaching and Games and infrastructure development. Gerard Treacy will address convention on Club Eirne's 5 year plan and I would ask everyone here to assist in recruitment whether within your club or business contacts or friends abroad.

Once again, many thanks to our loyal group of gate-people who turn up week after week in all weathers to ensure we maximise gate income. In particular I commend the many members of our minor and under 20 panels, both football and hurling, for assisting during the year in scanning and programme-selling. It is encouraging to see so many of our young players willing to help out.

Fermanagh GAA TV have provided an excellent service to our followers in the past 12 months. I cannot

stress enough the huge effort that this very small band of volunteers, led by Phil Flanagan, put in. It is particularly important for our diaspora and also supporters for health reasons etc who simply cannot attend our games in person. Financially it has become an important income stream and I would ask anyone with an interest in this form of media to get involved and maybe lighten the load or help to expand the service.

Grateful appreciation to all the clubs who have provided grounds and facilities for all our adult and underage competitions. It is hugely satisfying to see an uplift in the level of facilities at almost every club this year. Sean Donnelly's report elsewhere in this booklet is testament to that and we should be rightly proud of what is happening throughout the county in terms of facilities development. We have to compete with other sports in order to hold on to and increase membership and we are certainly stepping up to the plate in this area.

Cooperation between clubs and county has been excellent in my experience and it is this unity of purpose that gives Fermanagh strength.

My hanks to Brian and Tom and all my fellow County Board officers for their guidance and cooperation during the last 8 years.

Once again thanks to Katie, Des and Kevin from Crudden Dolan Accountants for the tremendous assistance they provide throughout the year.

I wish all our players, members, delegates, sponsors and supporters a very happy Christmas and a successful 2026.
